Outpost hospitals in Northern Ontario where the settlers, many of them returned men, are miles from medical assistance, have been built and furnished, one at Whitby recently receiving furniture from the Kingston branch, and now the news comes that a small hospital is being open ed in Bancroft, where patients in need of trained assistance can be treated. To follow up, to carry on when the excitement is over and the big subscriptions fall off, is the task the Red Cross has set itself to do and is doing nobly.
