APOSTOLIC DELEGATE COMING TO KINGSTON

To Lay Corner Stone of New Regiopolis College Building.

By order of His Grace the Most Rev. M. J. Spratt, Archbishop of Kingston, the commemoration of the centenary of the diocese will be held on Sunday, May 23rd.

On Saturday afternoon May 22nd at 4.10, daylight saving time, His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate will arrive at the Canadian Pacific Railway Company's station in a special private car.

The distinguished visitor will be conducted to the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception where he will receive addresses of welcome, followed by Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

On Sunday morning, May 23rd, there will be a solemn pontifical mass sung by His Grace the Archbishop of Kingston. The sermon will be delivered by Right Reverend Mgr. Hartigan, F.A., of Prescott.

On Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, daylight saving time, a procession will leave the Cathedral for Regiopolis College.

At Regiopolis College His Excellency the Apostolic Delegate will lay the cornerstone of the new building there. The sermon will be preached by one of Kingston's favorite and most famous sons, His Lordship Bishop Fallon, of London, Ont.

Employers Are Being Blamed

For Not Taking Strikers Back—The Home Secretary's Advice.

London, May 13.—"The trades unions have no alternative but to resist to the utmost any attempts to impose humiliating terms on the workers." A statement to this effect was issued by the Trades Union Congress to-day. After a special meeting called to consider the failure of employers to re-engage workers throughout the country.

From many sections of the country, reports indicate that the strike conditions still prevail to a large extent owing to the failure of union men to return to work for various reasons. In some instances, it is stated to be the men's desire to take advantage of the strike to exact better terms of employment, but the main reason for the continued tie up apparently lies in the fact that the workers are resisting attempt by employers to get them to cast off their union affiliations.

The authorities to-day predicted that the return to normal conditions would probably be slow. The Congress statement says: "Our resisting power is unimpaired. We cannot tolerate the imposition of conditions designed to destroy trades unionism. Peace, without vindictiveness is impossible unless the attacks are stopped immediately. Workers will not surrender their hard-earned gains."

Home Secretary's Statement.

Sir William Joynson Hicks, Home Secretary broadcast a message saying: "The Government feels sure that all employers who have been assisted in meeting the requirements of the emergency by the volunteer labor will recognize the great civic services those men performed with them. It is suggested that employers, dispensing without notice with the services of any paid voluntary workers, should follow the practice which the Government propose to pursue and grant a gratuity of at least two days' pay."
