**Sent to the "Pen."**  
Pleading guilty at Windsor to six charges of housebreaking, George Riley, aged twenty-five years, of Columbus, Ohio, and Edward Dolan, of Toronto, were each sentenced to a term of five years in the Portsmouth penitentiary. Both men have long careers of crime. They were arrested at London ten days ago, after they had driven away a stolen car from the Windsor downtown district. Dolan admitted having served a penitentiary term for housebreaking in Toronto.
