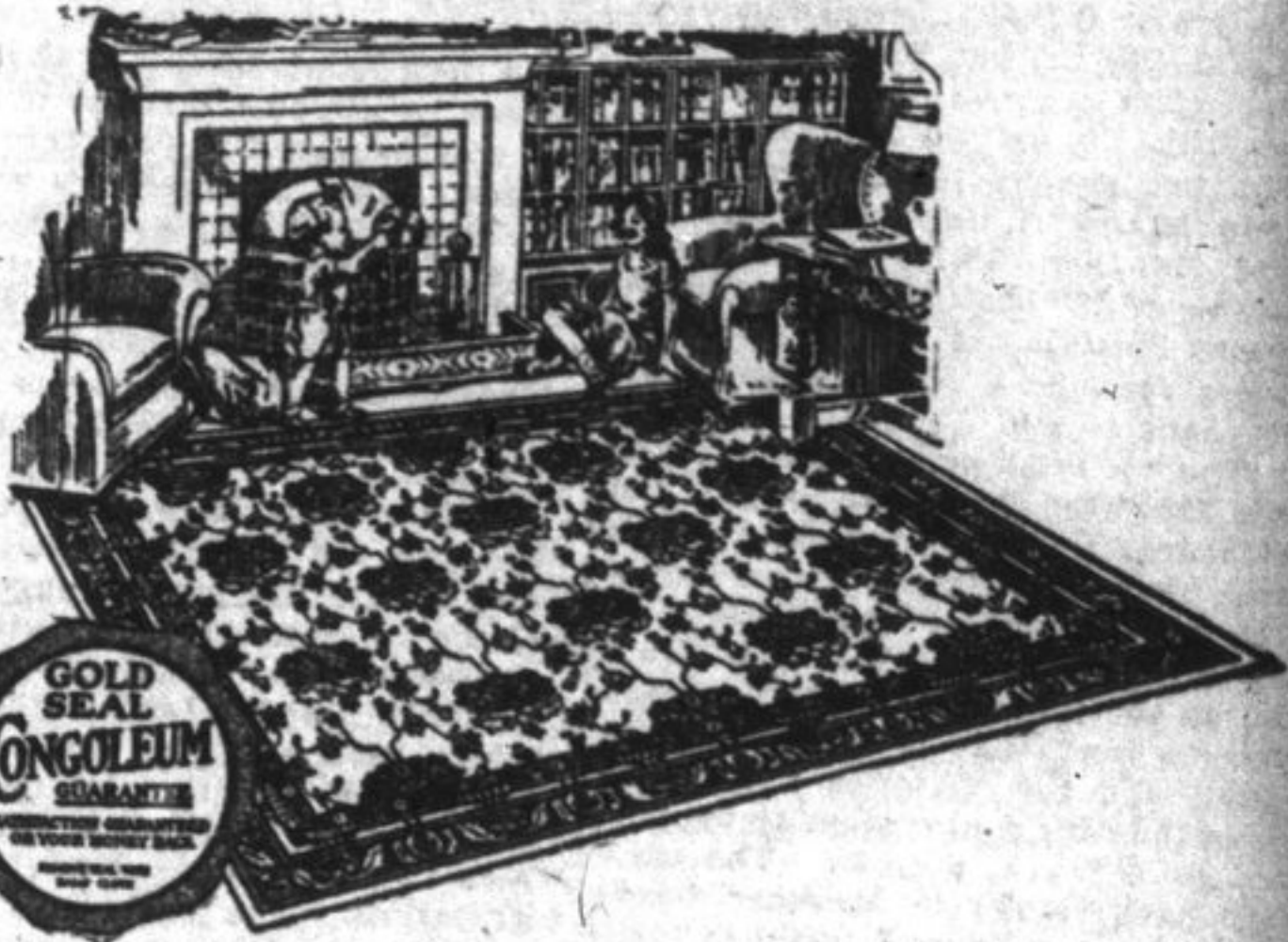
It was pleasant news to hear that Mr. Christopher Knight's condition showed some improvement on Saturday and Sunday.
