'A Social Celebrity' and 'Moana' Divide Honors for First Three Days.

Adolphe Menjou, the Paramount star, whose latest opus, 'A Social Celebrity,' opens at the Capitol today, together with 'Moana,' plays the role of a barber.

TOURIST CAMP ASSURED.

At Lake Ontario Park—Open in Two Weeks.

The Kingston Tourist Camp at Lake Ontario Park is now practically assured, and will be open for tourists in about two weeks. It was learned from officials of the Kingston and District Tourist Association to-day, following the guarantee of a water supply from Rockwood Hospital, several other matters which had been delaying the actual starting of work were cleared up, and it is believed that at a meeting this afternoon the last obstacle will be overcome.

Tenders for the construction work will be called for within the next few days and by the end of the month Kingston should have one of the best motor camps in Ontario.

A STEAMER BURNS AND SINKS IN LAKE

Crew of Charles Horn Rescued by Passing Vessel and Landed Safely.

Pictou, May 17.—The steamer Charles Horn was burned and sunk off Peter's Point, in Lake Ontario, yesterday. The crew of seventeen were picked up by a passing steamer and landed at Cape Vincent.

The Charles Horn is owned by the Horn Lumber Company of Chicago. Captain Christensen was in command. The same vessel was badly burned at her winter quarters here two years ago. She was a wooden vessel of 847 tons. The steamer was en route to Ogdensburg from Buffalo.

Motorcyclists Injured In Collision With Auto

Belleville, May 17.—Edwin Terou and Arthur Champagne, both of Detroit, were proceeding to this city Sunday afternoon in a motorcycle with sidecar, when they collided with a car on the Striving Road, about six miles from the city. Terou had his left leg fractured and sustained other injuries. Champagne whilst escaping serious injuries was severely bruised about the body. Both were brought to the hospital here for treatment. The car, owned by J. Guillevy, of this city, was damaged to a considerable extent.

Ultimatum to League.

Geneva, Switzerland, May 17.—Spain's representative on Saturday informed the commission charged with studying reorganization of the League of Nations Council that unless she is accorded a permanent Council seat Spain will be convinced that it is not useful to collaborate longer with the League.

This was interpreted generally as a threat of resignation.

To Be Superannuated. Toronto, May 17.—The superannuation of Dr. P. S. Campbell, professor of Greek for thirty-seven years at McMaster university, and an ardent champion of fundamentalism, will be announced at the annual convocation to be held Tuesday.

His retirement removes from the Baptist institution one of its greatest foes against the teaching of modern doctrinal.

Canadian Marine Improvement. Montreal, May 17.—An improvement of more than \$400,000 is the financial results for the operations of the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, Limited, during the four months ended April 30th, 1926, as compared with the same period of 1925 is shown by the summary of operating figures issued to-day.

Czechoslovakia Defeats India. Prague, May 17.—Czechoslovakia has eliminated India from the European zone elimination play for the Davis Cup, taking four out of five matches.

POLAND NOW HAS A NEW CABINET

Will the New Foreign Policy Lean to a German Alliance?

Warsaw, Poland, May 17.—A new Cabinet, headed by Professor Charles Bartel as Prime Minister, was formed Saturday night. August Zahalski, former ambassador to Rome, was named temporary minister of foreign affairs. Marshal Pilsudski took over the portfolio of minister of war.

Prime Minister Bartel announced that the Government would remain in office until after the election of a new President for the Republic.

Disapproval in France.

Paris, May 17.—Pilsudski's accession to power in Poland means that his coup d'etat is being watched with an eagle eye not only by the Quai d'Orsay but by every foreign office in Europe. The great question for other European nations is this—will Poland's new master continue the pro-French policy which has shaped Poland's foreign relations since the war, or will he inaugurate a more independent policy? Putting it bluntly, the question raised is—will Pilsudski lean away from France towards Germany?

He is known to be much more nearly a friend of Germany than his predecessors.

Pilsudski's Demands. Vienna, May 17.—Despatches from Warsaw say that Marshal Pilsudski

has demanded power to prorogue parliament for one year. He also has demanded that all members of the retiring government be court-martialed. The Central committee of the Socialist party has demanded that all 'corruptionists' in the Witos cabinet be punished.

Nurse Ill With Scarlet Fever.

Inverary, May 17.—The many friends of Miss Fredericka Ferguson, nurse-in-training at the General Hospital, Kingston, are sorry to hear she is ill with scarlet fever. The meeting of the Women's Institute met on Thursday at Mrs. Ira Darling's home. The officers for the following year were installed. Arbour Day was observed in the Public School here on Friday.

Tax Rate of Belleville.

Belleville, Ont., May 17.—The tax rate of the city for this year will be 39 1-16 mills, an increase of one-tenth of a mill over last year. Nearly \$100,000 is required this year for high and public schools. The taxes will be collected in two instalments.

Was Hit By a Car.

Fred Delacore was struck by an automobile at the corner of Princess and Montreal streets about nine o'clock on Saturday night, and suffered a severe shaking up, but after a short stay in the Hotel Dieu he was able to go to his home.

The death occurred on Friday at Dundalk, Ont., of Alexander Corbett, a native of Lansdowne, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. T. F. Lockhart. Dr. Mallory succeeds Dr. Beckwith in dentistry in Brockville. He is a son of Mr. Omar Mallory, postmaster at Lyn.

POST OFFICES CONGESTED

Railway Traffic Only Fifty Per Cent Normal.

London, May 17.—Although most industries are steadily recovering from the effects of the general strike only one railway system was able to give full service today. Other railway companies announced that they were unable to give more than 50 per cent of normal service. Post offices are congested with mail and parcel post. Parcel post service was suspended entirely during the strike, and when the workers began to go back and it was announced that parcel post would be accepted, packages came in such numbers that depots were snowed under.

Crushed to Death.

St. Catharines, May 17.—A Montreal man, George Bell, 35, was crushed to death here late Friday night on his boat, the Edward Strong, as it was passing up Welland Canal. In getting the boat through Lock 12, Bell, who was employed on the boat as watchman, was caught in a big rope and dragged into the winches. An inquest will probably be held.

Anglo-French Debt Discussion.

Lopdon, May 17.—Right Hon. Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the Exchequer, and M. Peret, French Finance Minister, met this evening for their first conversation regarding Anglo-French debt settlement.

German Referendum.

Berlin, May 17.—The Marx Cabinet has decided that a national referendum on the question of confederation without indemnification of property of the former German ruling houses will be held on June 20th.
