Collegiate Institute Teachers.
The Brockville Board of Education has re-engaged nearly all the teachers in the Collegiate Institute, with these additions: Miss M. Dorothy Marston, Toronto, at a salary of \$1,700.00, and G. D. Scoville, Toronto, at a salary of \$3,000, to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of Mrs. Macintosh and S. J. Cox.

Chinese Decoration Service.
About fifty members of the Chinese colony in Kingston motored to Cataract cemetery Sunday afternoon to hold a commemorative service at the graves of their departed countrymen, an annual event held each year in the month of May. The graves were decorated with flowers and fire crackers were exploded in keeping with the Chinese custom. The service lasted about an hour and a half.

Dredge Ferry Approach.
The Brockville and Morristown Ferry Company is preparing to dredge an approach to its new terminal at Brockville to a depth of eight feet. The work is to be completed by June 4th. The steamer Elmer W. Jones, which is to ply between Brockville and Morristown, N.Y., is now en route to the St. Lawrence from the Connecticut shipyard, in which it was built.

Deception Is Alleged.
Charged with sale under false pretenses, Phillip Reid, who resides near Shannonville will come up for trial on May 25th at Belleville. Representing a horse as being in sound condition in making the sale, it is alleged he administered dope to complete the deception and the buyer purchased the animal on the assumption that its lively condition was natural. When oil dabbles slowed up the buyer became suspicious, and the arrest ensued.

Enjoyed Motion Pictures.
On Thursday and Friday evenings last, the Chinese of Kingston enjoyed a series of motion pictures at their library, shown by Dr. Luey, Vancouver, who is touring Canada showing the pictures to the Chinese colonies in the principal cities. Views of funeral rites and pictures taken in Peking were shown and the evenings were very much enjoyed by the large number present.

Dynamite Cap Exploded.
Elmer Martin, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Martin, Smith's Falls, escaped fatal injury while he was playing with a dynamite cap in front of his home. The cap exploded under the child's hands as he was striking it with a stone. The detonation was heard nearly a quarter of a mile away and scores of persons investigated. The child

was found with both hands badly torn and one thigh wounded but in some miraculous manner he escaped more serious injury.

Will Unveil Tablet.
A bronze memorial tablet commemorating the sacrifice of graduates of the Athens High School who fell during the war will be unveiled in the school on May 27th, addresses being given by Rev. A. B. Payna, and by Rev. Arthur E. Hagar, who was chaplain of the 156th Overseas Battalion. The tablet has been purchased by the Literary Society of the school to replace that which was destroyed in the burning of the old building.

Queen's Endowment Drive.
Prof. D. A. McArthur, of Queen's University, as the guest on Saturday afternoon at a luncheon given by Senator Andrew Hayden in the Parliamentary Restaurant, gave a very interesting account of his recent trip through the west in the interests of the \$2,500,000 endowment campaign which the university has under way. Sir Robert Borden, chancellor of the university, also spoke briefly and pointed out that the present campaign could only be made successful in the proportion that the graduates worked to make it so.

To Attend Annual Inspection.
Invitations have been sent to the Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs, Knights of Columbus, Daughters of the Empire, Great War Veterans and other clubs to attend the annual inspection of the Cadet Corps of the public schools in the city, Regiopolis College and Kingston Collegiate Institute, to be held Wednesday at the Cricket Field at three o'clock.

The corps in the different schools and the colleges held their final drills, in uniform, Tuesday afternoon, in preparation for the inspection. The instruction of the cadets has been under capable tutors and the young lads will present a very neat appearance at the inspection.

TEN-YEAR-OLD BOY WINS SILVER MEDAL

Edward Rechab Murch Takes Honors in Boys' Soprano Solo Competition.
