Visitors in Town. Rev. Glenn Sherman and Mrs. Sherman, Lanark, have been recent guests of the latter's parents.

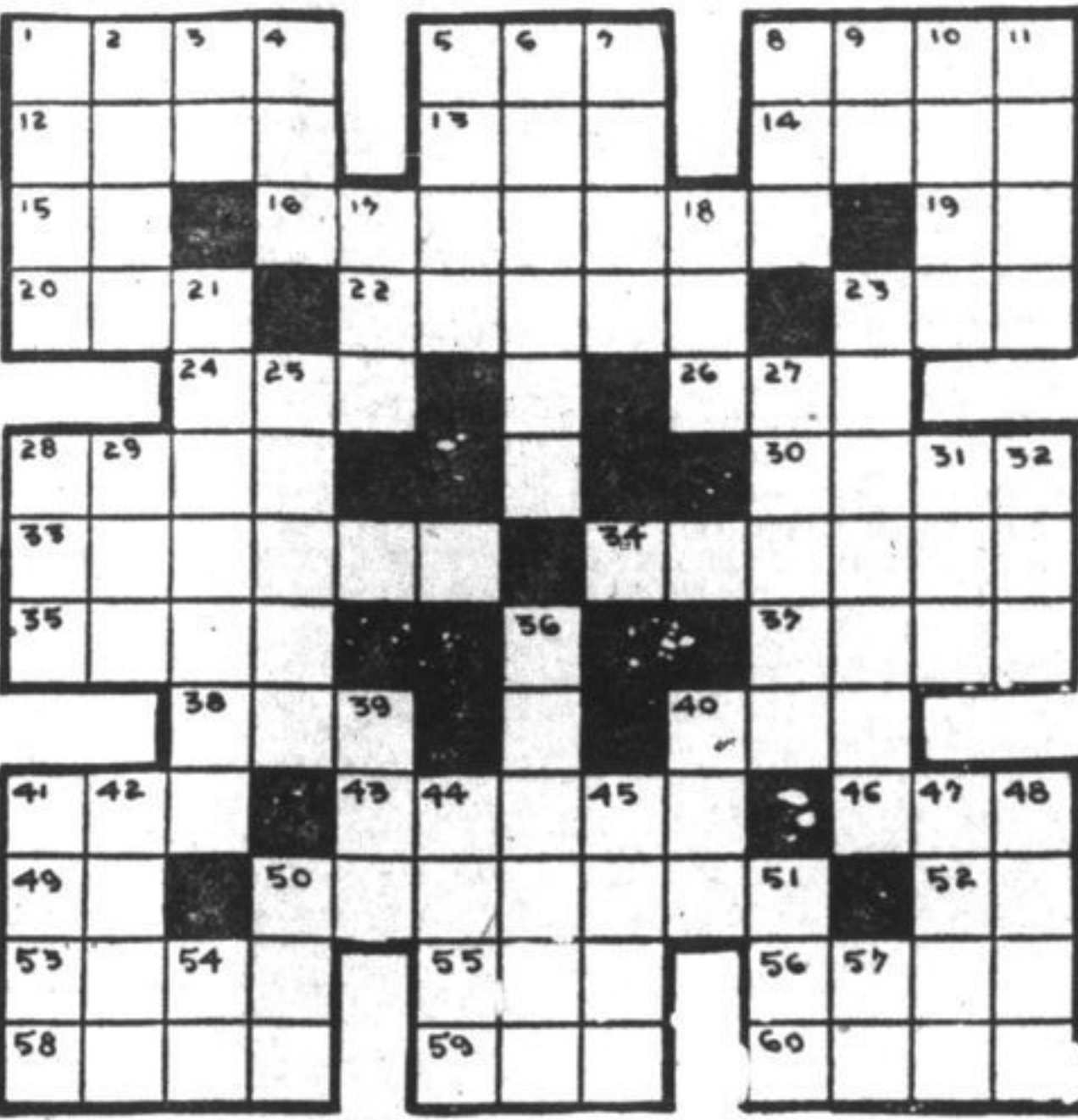
