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QUEEN'S MEDICAL CONVOCATION HELD

Address to the Graduates Delivered by the Dean of Ontario.

The annual convocation of Queen's Medical School was conducted in Convocation Hall on Wednesday afternoon, with Dean J. C. Connell presiding. Nearly all of the young men who graduated this year were present to receive their diplomas and the crowd of spectators was so large that the seating capacity of Convocation Hall was not nearly sufficient to accommodate those who wished to see the ceremony.

A large number stood during the entire convocation at the door, on the stairway leading to the gallery and in the hall.

Principal Taylor was to have been present to deliver the farewell address to the class, but shortly before Convocation he was summoned to appear as a witness in the case which is proceeding against the University in the Supreme Court.

In his absence Dean Connell addressed the class and wished them every success in their profession. Dean W. W. Craig of Diocese of Ontario delivered the address of the day.

On the platform was the medical faculty of the University, Dean Craig, Capt. John Donnelly and Rev. Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray, representing the trustees board, Dr. W. G. Amelia and ex-Mayor John McKelvey. It was a particularly proud day for Mr. McKelvey as his grandson, John ("Red") McKelvey, famous Canadian football star, received the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

The Rev. Dr. Craig, was chaplain for the day, and delivered the convocation address to the graduates. He paid a tribute to medical service and the medical profession, noting the facts that doctors are the guardians of public morality; are members of a profession of vast integrity; and that medical service has made a noble contribution not only to its own particular department of human knowledge but to truth in general.

The dean developed his address further by enlarging upon the dangers of superstition, as embodied in quackery, as the foe against which the medical profession must guard; the value of romance to life and action, pointing out the romantic possibilities of the doctors' life and work in particular; and spoke of the value had eternal validity of ethics and idealism in professional life.

A tribute was paid to a noble idealist in the medical profession, viz.—Dr. Albert Schweitzer, who at the call of duty gave up life and work in Europe to minister to the natives of Africa.

In conclusion the Dean conveyed the congratulations and good wishes of all present to the graduates of the medical school.

Repairs to Wolfe Islander.

It is estimated that it will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,500 to make the hull repairs to the steamer Wolfe Islander which at the present time is in the Davis Dry Dock. About ten days ago the steamer entered the dock. When the sheet iron was removed from the bilge, it was found that the timbers were in very bad state of repair. M. R. Davis, inspector of hulls for the Dominion Government, has been constantly on the job showing the ship carpenters the timbers that were to be replaced.

On Wednesday morning, when a representative of the Whig visited the dock, he found that nearly all the bilge on either side of the steamer had been taken away. The one side had been completed and the work is being rushed along on the other. The bilge will nearly all be new. The bottom timbers are in first class condition. It is expected that the steamer will be able to leave the dock about a week from next Saturday.

According to the regulations of the marine department, all steamers are to be placed in dock every three years at least, and have their hulls repaired. During the time that the Wolfe Islander is in dock, islanders have to come to and from the island by motor boats and on Saturday a steamer is brought into service.
