**ARRANGE FOR OPENING OF THE PLAYGROUNDS**

Supervisors and Caretakers Appointed at a Meeting of the Parks Committee.  
At a meeting of the civic parks committee held on Friday afternoon, supervisors, assistant supervisors and caretakers were appointed for the playgrounds at Frontenac and Victoria Parks. Miss Wilton, who has served as supervisor at Victoria Park resigned, owing to the fact that she is taking a course at Queen's Summer School this year and this necessitated the appointment of a successor. Miss Helen Rogers will be supervisor at Victoria Park, while Miss Claire Monk, who last year helped in the work of and on, when extra help was needed, and is well acquainted with the work, will be assistant.  
Miss Lillian M. Newell will be supervisor at Frontenac Park, with Miss Gwendolyn Holland as assistant.  
Mr. Whitcomb, who was caretaker at Frontenac Park last season, was reappointed, while Fred R. Mayben was appointed caretaker at Victoria Park.  
The salaries will remain the same as last year. For supervisors, \$15 per week; assistant supervisors, \$12, and the caretakers \$12.

**UNUSUAL SITUATION IN RECONCILIATION CASE**

**Wife Wants to Take Care of Other Woman's Child.**

The Ottawa Citizen of Thursday has the following:  
"The Children's Aid Society, at its meeting yesterday afternoon, had an interesting case concerning a child whose father wants to take him back.  
Some time ago a man who had been living with a woman not his wife and their two children was arrested and sentenced to three months for corrupting children. This man's wife had left him seven years ago and had gone to Kingston, where she secured work. The woman he had been living with was recently married and took the younger of the two children to her new home, with the approval of her husband. About a month ago the man's wife returned from Kingston and a reconciliation was effected. The man now wants the other child, a boy, now nine years of age, and his wife is also anxious to have the boy, as she says he will be company for her and that the reconciliation is likely to be more lasting if her husband has his child at home. The husband is working and apparently has settled down. There was quite a discussion, but finally the society decided that it was more concerned with the welfare of the child than with the happiness of the father and his wife, and the child will be kept in the Children's Shelter, where it now is. Mr. A. G. Munro, the secretary, had advised the father to leave the child for three months, until it is seen how the reconciliation with his wife works out. The case may then be reopened."
