WILD GEESE

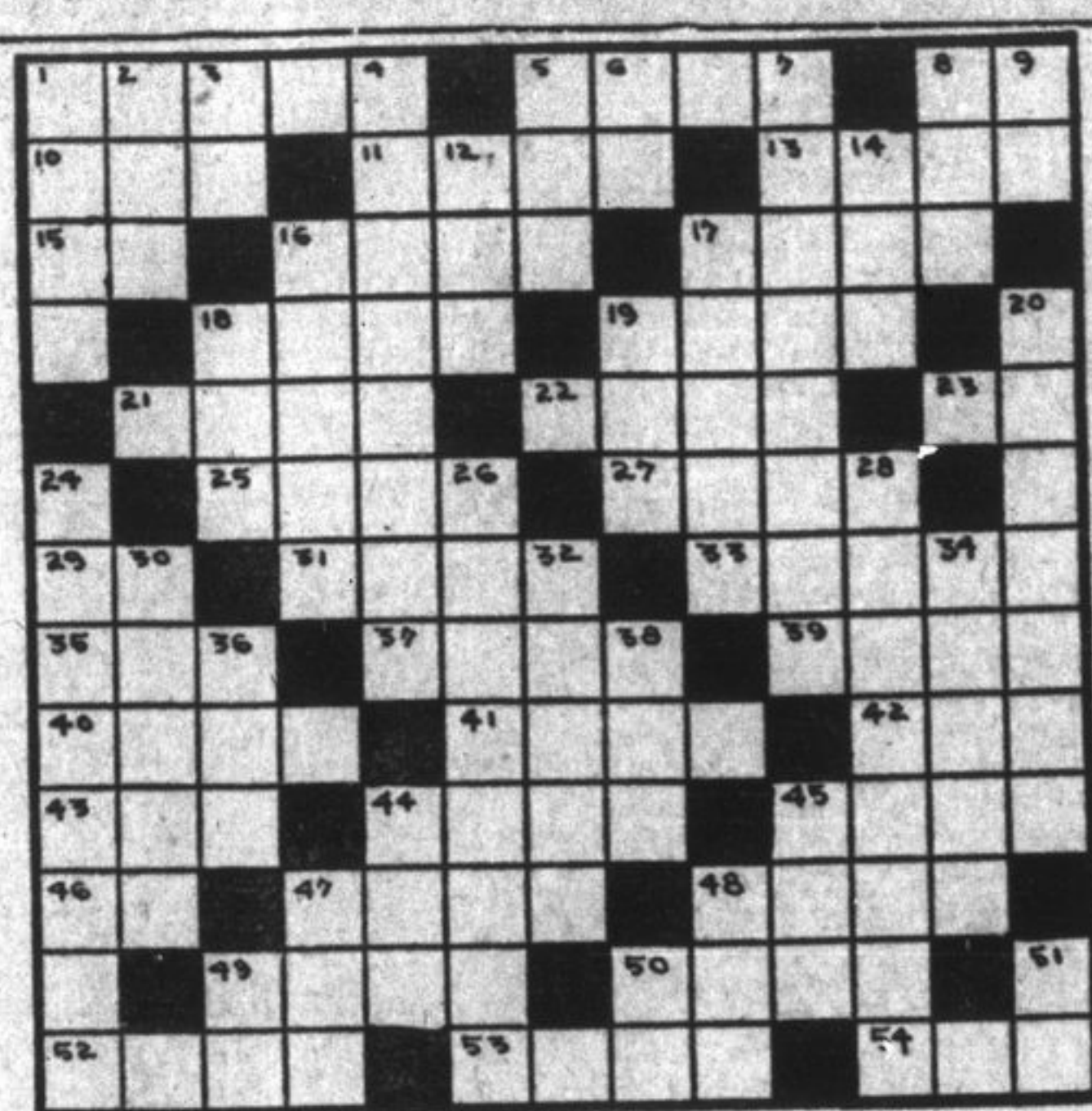
