 "Charley's Aunt" and "The Man on the Box" established Syd Chaplin in the front rank of screen stars. Even Brother Charlie probably never caused more actual laughter in any two pictures than Brother Syd did in those first two.

GAVE FINE TALK ON MARGARET BOURGEOYS

Miss Almon Doolan Speaks Before the Catholic Women's League.

A meeting of the Catholic Women's League was held on Tuesday evening in the Catholic Assembly Hall, there being a large attendance. Mrs. C. J. Corrigan, the president, occupied the chair, and introduced the speaker, Miss Almon Doolan, who spoke on "Margaret Bourgeois." Miss Doolan spoke of Margaret Bourgeois as the founder of the Community of the Congregation de Notre Dame, her hardships in getting established in Canada and her early work.

Her first habitation to carry on her work was in a loft over a cowshed in a stone building loaned to her by Malesmeuse, then Governor of Canada. From here she administered to the inhabitants of Villa Marie, now Montreal. This was the nucleus of what has become known as the greatest teaching community in North America.

Miss Bessie Bedore, convener of education, moved the vote of thanks to the speaker, mentioning that Miss Doolan was a graduate of Notre Dame and a younger member of this sub-division. The appreciation of the meeting was extended to the speaker by the president, Mrs. Corrigan, for the splendid address given.

Reports were received and passed. Mrs. M. Mangan reporting for membership, Miss Bessie Bedore for education. Mrs. F. Pilley for social welfare and Miss Agnes Doolan for the Girl Guides committee. A letter of warm appreciation was read by the secretary, Mrs. M. Bohan, from His Grace Archbishop Spratt for the grant of \$100 by the League in connection with the laying of the cornerstone at Regiopolis College a week ago Sunday.

BOY ON BICYCLE HAD VERY NARROW ESCAPE

An Auto Driver's Quick Action Saved Him From Serious Injury.

But for the presence of mind of some careful automobile driver and the perfect condition of the brakes on the car, a young Kingston boy would probably have suffered serious injuries at the corner of Prince and Bagot streets Tuesday evening. The lad was riding a bicycle and turned around a few feet from the intersection, driving along on the wrong side of the road in the path of any automobile rounding the corner. Just as the car, an automobile turned the corner, and the driver, seeing the boy, slammed on his brakes less than a foot away from the lad, and brought the car to a stop.

Bicycle riders should be more careful. If there had been a defect in the brakes of the car which nearly struck the boy Tuesday evening, he would undoubtedly have been knocked off his bicycle and likely seriously injured. All motorists here should be reminded of the fact that the driver displayed in the case mentioned.

THE MEDALS WON

By the Kingston Sea Cadets in Rifle Competitions.

The medals, won by the Kingston Sea Cadets in the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association competition, have been received and will be presented to the cadets this summer, probably at their annual inspection. Two teams, a junior and a senior, were entered and both made a creditable showing.

CHESTER D. MASSEY DIES AT TORONTO

The Deceased Was One of Canada's Leading Philanthropists.

Toronto, June 2.—The death occurred at 12:30 o'clock this (Wednesday) morning of Chester Daniel Massey, honorary president of the Massey-Harris Co., and one of Canada's outstanding philanthropists. Bronchial pneumonia was the cause of death which took place at his residence, 519 Jarvis street, after an illness of several months.

The late Mr. Massey, who was twice married, leaves two sons, Hon. Vincent and Raymond Hart Massey by his first wife, Anna Donna Vincent of Erie, Pa. His second wife, who died in 1921, was Margaret Phelps of Gloversville, N.Y. In religion Mr. Massey was a Methodist of lifelong standing.

He was the second son of the late Hart A. Massey, and grandson of Daniel Massey, who founded in Newcastle in 1847, the business of moving agricultural implements, which grew into the great corporation known as Massey-Harris Company, Limited, with its main factory and head office in Toronto. Mr. Massey at the time of his death held the position of honorary president of the Massey-Harris Company, and was also a director of the National Trust Company. He was born in Haldimand Township, Northumberland County, on June 17th, 1850. His family originally came from Vermont about the year 1830.

Ontario Board Reports 4,979 Accidents During May

Toronto, June 2.—The number of accidents reported to the Workers' Compensation Board during the month of May was 4,979 as against 4,449 in April. However, the benefits awarded were lower, the total for May being \$476,159.76 for April. The year 1926 up to the present time shows an increase both in the number of accidents and in the amount of benefits.
