The Editor Hears

That week-end visitors in the country may have had the luck to see a brilliant flash of scarlet among the tiny opening leaves of the trees and perhaps even to see nearer our annual spring visitor, a scarlet tanager. Several lucky people, sitting on the verandah of a summer home not far from Kingston, saw the vivid red spot in the branches of a nearby tree. One said "It is an oriole," but as the bird came nearer they saw it was a clear deep scarlet. The field glasses being near at hand and the bird being very tame they examined it, and found its body was a wonder red and its wings jet black, its bill rather full and strong and its size about the same as an oriole. "One need not go to the tropics for brilliant coloring," said one of the group. "No tropical bird is more vivid in its hue." The tanagers have frequently been seen in this vicinity lately and are said to nest in southern Ontario. There is another bird that visits us at this time and is sometimes called the tanager, but is really the cardinal grosbeak. He is larger and has no black markings. He and his mate are seen in swamps, but the mother bird is not so highly colored, so is not so noticeable.
