She is survived by her parents, her husband, twin sons, George and Arthur, aged five years, and Jack, aged ten years; four brothers, Dr. C. A. Publow, of Picton, Dr. Arthur Publow of Thorold, Ivan and Walter of Kingston; also by one sister, Miss Ida Publow, Kingston.

Mrs. Kinnear was a woman of winsomeness and charm, intensely interested in her home and sons, companionable, and socially a great favorite. Her death, in the bloom of womanhood, and with so many ties binding her to loved ones, has created wide sympathy and much sorrow. Her gentleness, affection and sweet-mindedness will long be cherished by those who mourn.

The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon at 1.30 o'clock to Perth where interment will take place. The funeral service will be conducted by Rev. Dr. Macgillivray and Rev. G. A. Brown of Chalmers church.

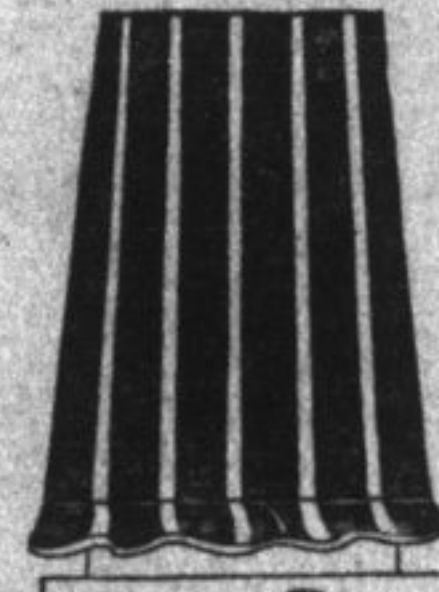

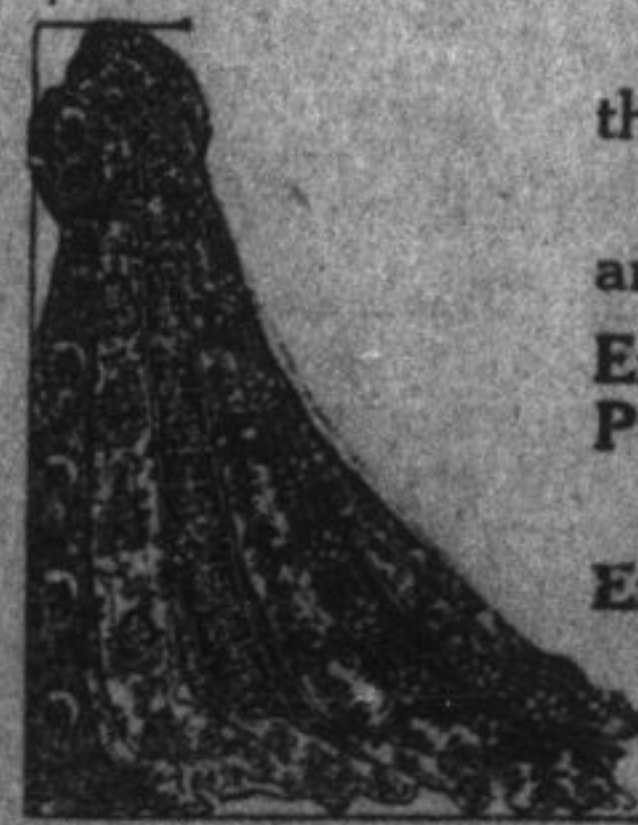
