**Stricken at Hospital.**  
Mrs. Robert M. Stewart, Renfrew, apparently in the best of health, walked about half a mile to Renfrew Hospital on Wednesday night to see two friends who were patients there, and soon after her arrival was stricken with heart trouble and died. She was in her sixty-sixth year.

The directors of the Kingston Industrial Fair held a meeting on Friday evening to revise the prize list and to complete all arrangements for their excursion to Ottawa. Also the matter of the loan of the by-law to provide for the improvement of the fair grounds was discussed and the directors as a whole expressed great disappointment.

Mrs. Hubbard was born on Grindstone island, about twenty-one years ago, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hubbard Garnsey, who survive. Within the past year she married Peri Matthews, a well-known resident of Clayton. She had been ill but a short time.

**Firemen Elect Officers.**

**Explanation of Deficit.**  
The item estimated deficit for 1925, \$13,908.33, which appears in the Frontenac County Council budget, is caused through the fact that from the time the Provincial highway was built in this county in 1919 until 1924 nothing was included in the budget for maintenance. Last year the rate was raised to 15 mills in an effort to wipe out some of this accumulated debt but to have wiped out the whole debt would have meant the raising of the rate to about 20 mills. It was decided to keep the rate at 15 mills for a period of three or four years and carry a deficit each year until this money had all been made up.

Mr. and Mrs. William Hunt. Her sister, Lucy, became the bride of James Polley, Brockville, earlier in the day.

**Had a Bad Collision.**  
An auto accident took place on Wednesday night near Alexandria Bay. Two cars collided, one hitting the other just back of the front; left wheel and hurled it into the ditch turning it over three times and completely demolishing it. The front of the other was badly wrecked but was not turned over. All of the seven young men in the cars were cut and shaken, one, John LaFavre, having a rib fractured. One of the drivers claimed that the other car was in the middle of the road and would not get over, causing the collision.
