G.W.V.A. DELEGATES PRESENT REPORTS

Tell of Impressive Ceremony
at London Over Change
of Name.

THE CORNER STONE OF CITY BUILDINGS Was Laid Eighty-three Years Ago—Our Forefathers Were Wise.

Saturday last marked the eighty-third anniversary of the laying of the corner stone of the Kingston city buildings. The stone was laid by His Excellency the Right Hon. Sir C. Theophilus Metcalf, Bart., G.C.B., Governor-General of British North America.

The records show that the city buildings originally cost \$125,000, but it is stated that to-day they could not be built for less than half a million.

Our forefathers certainly looked into the future when they erected these buildings," said Mayor Angrove, in speaking about the city buildings—the pride of every citizen. "It shows that they had confidence in their city. They did big things in those days."

It is of interest to note that John Counter, who was mayor of the city at that time, and who, by the way, was the first mayor of Kingston, made a special trip to England to borrow twenty thousand pounds sterling, on corporation securities. He succeeded in raising the loan, which the old Commercial Bank of the day had refused to advance.

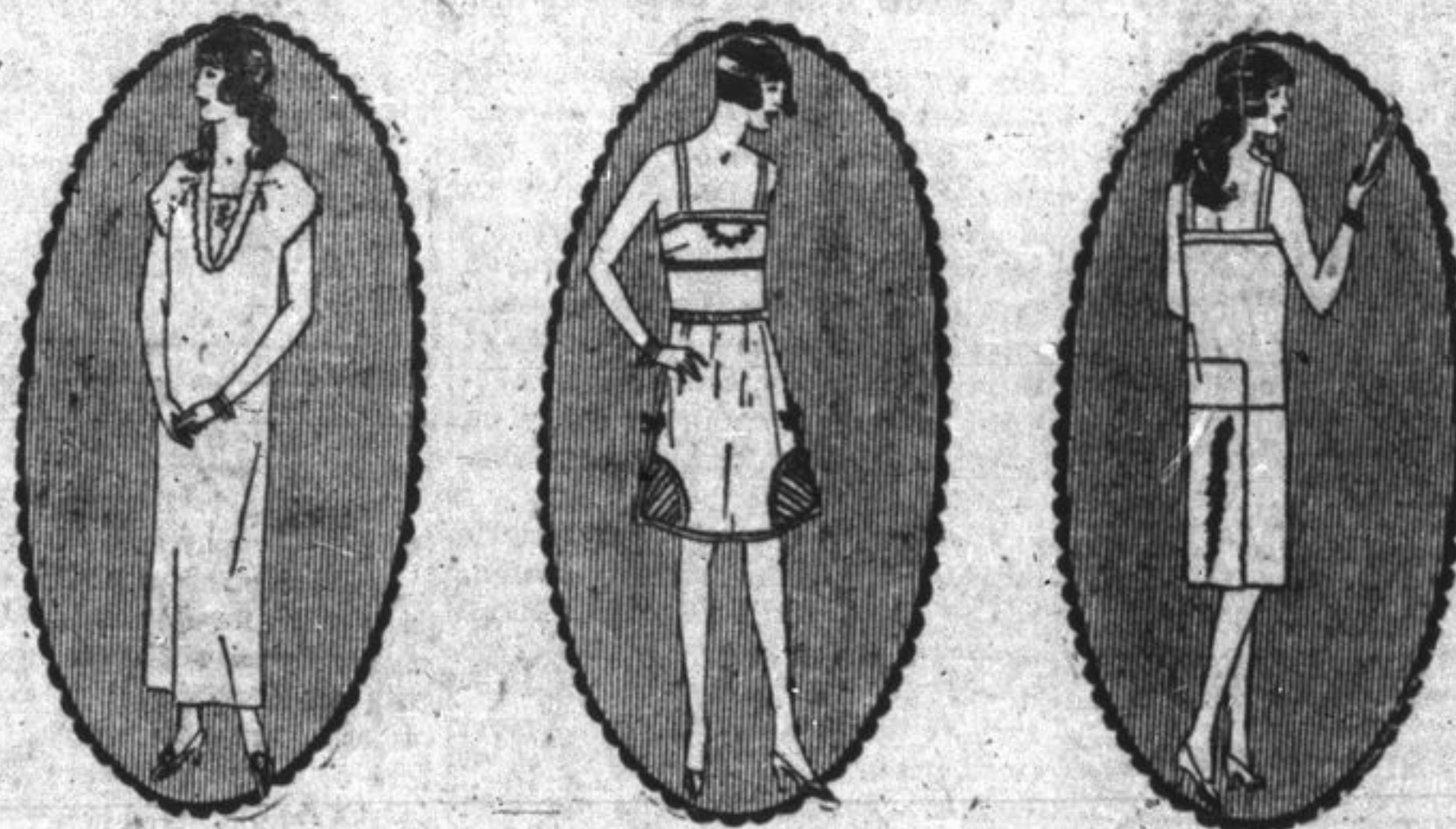
