According to the story told by Mr. Palmateer, the teamster employed by Walter O'Donnell, he was directed by Mr. Purvis where to back his team to take out the stone and his evidence was that the accident was caused when Mr. Purvis with sledge knocked out a certain stone which was in such a strategic position that the strength of the whole wall depended on it. Palmateer also stated that when the wall fell the hind quarters of both the horse were covered with stones and the leg of one horse was held down by the tongue of the wagon. The wit ness believed that when the wall fell it forced the particular horse injured in the accident, against a sharp stone in the foundation of the wall which inflicted the wound that later resulted in death.

Mr. Purvis told a totally different story. He said that he had not di-

rected Mr. Palmateer where to back his team. On the contrary he did not know that Mr. Palmateer was near the building until a very few minutes before the accident because he was working inside the building.
