The runner from second overruns third, a snap throw from the catcher retires him, making the third out. In the meantime the runner from third has not yet touched the plate.

Despite this, the run counts and he can continue on to the plate after the third out. A base on balls to the batsman with the bases filled, legally scores the runner from third.
