**Suspended Sentence.**

Driver, presented a largely signed petition from residents of Westport and North Crosby and made an appeal to the judge for clemency. The accused was allowed to go on suspended sentence.

**Secured a Divorce.**

This was the second time the case has been tried, the first time having been last year before Justice Edward N. Smith of Watertown. Justice Smith refusing the grant of a decree on the ground that it was based on unreliable detective evidence.

About three hundred and fifty people boarded the Kingston Industrial Exhibition excursion train for Ottawa at the Canadian National Railway station Wednesday morning, the largest crowd that has ever left on the excursion from Kingston. About two hundred more were taken on at Harrowsmith, Sydenham and other places on the route where the train stopped.
