

SPLENDID REPORTS ON WORK OF Y.M.C.A.

The Board of Directors Anticipate a Successful Summer's Programme.

A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Y.M.C.A. was held on Wednesday evening, splendid reports of the various committees during the month of May being received.

Mr. C. C. Wyatt, reporting for the physical committee, showed that six one-session were held during the month and that the attendance was 492. The Sea Cadet Corps held eight classes in swimming instruction. The report gave the information that the physical instructor, Mr. P. H. Brockel had co-operated with the forming of softball teams both for girls and boys, and that the interest was very high in the game. Mention was made of the tennis club, which is progressing very favorably.

The property committee report, presented by Mr. H. Wilder, gave estimates of the improvements to be made during the summer. There was considerable discussion on the addition of new dormitories and it was decided that they were very essential. Mr. B. I. England's plan for financing the work, that of selling bonds, was left for later action.

Mr. T. A. Kidd gave the report of the finance committee, and Dr. C. C. Nash that of the foreign service committee. Plans were made for the raising of the \$250 budget for the foreign committee.

The reports received were all considered to be very good and the Y.M.C.A. is anticipating a successful and progressive summer.

BANK MANAGER ENDS LIFE

Had Been Suspended the Day-Before Tragedy. Ottawa, June 10.—Gustave Archambault, manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Glen Robertson, Ontario, on Tuesday shot and killed himself at his home, is a former Ottawa man, a son of the late Alfred Archambault, for 20 years a member of the Public Archives.

Archambault shot and killed himself shortly before noon in his apartments above the bank, while inspectors were examining the bank's books. It has been stated that he had been suspended as manager the day previous to the fatality.

Not feeling well, he remained in his bed yesterday morning. His wife and 18-months-old baby were in the apartments with him, and the inspectors were working in the bank directly below, when, shortly before noon, a shot rang out. The bank staff rushed to Archambault's apartments, and found him dead in bed with a bullet wound in his head.
