Picton, June 10.—The General Sessions of the Peace for Prince Edward County closed yesterday. They were held before His Honor, Judge Deroche. Elmer Boice Wittale of Hillier applied for naturalization papers which were favorably considered. There were no cases in County Court so the petit jurors were dismissed on Tuesday. The Grand Jury were called upon to sit upon a case touching a charge of criminal negligence against William Tait, head of the Hydro-Electric in Picton, arising out of a fatality caused by a live Hydro wire falling to the street in a storm nearly a year ago. The case had previously been dismissed by the police magistrate. The Grand Jury considered the indictment and found "no bill." The Grand Jury visited the public institutions Wednesday morning, made their presentment and were dismissed.

To Vote on School Site. On June 14th the taxpayers of Alexandria Bay will vote, for the fifth time in two years, to decide the site for a new school. The LaVigne property will be one site offered. It consists of four and a half acres of Capt. C. S. Thompson's land and seven and a half acres of the LaVigne property and the Frando Slato and Vernon Newberry property in Bolton and McCue avenues at a price of \$9,500. This land was rejected by the taxpayers at a recent election. The Jarvis site, rejected twice before, is offered. It consists of land in Church street of seventeen acres and is offered for \$12,000.
