

### CALL FOR NEW TENDERS FOR CARPENTER WORK

#### Board of Education Deals With Unusual Contract Situation at Louise School.

The members of the Board of Education held a meeting on Thursday night, cleaned off all the business on the slate, and adjourned for the summer months.

The property committee recommended, "That the tender of W. Bruce & Son, \$2,925, for carpenter work for proposed alterations to Louise school be accepted, instead of the tender of J. King & Son, who amended their former tender," but after the matter was discussed at some length, it was decided, on motion of Trustees Mills and Bishop, to call for new tenders. The amendment to call for new tenders was carried by a vote of 7 to 4, Chairman Best giving the deciding vote.

Trustees Baldwin, Lemmon and Newlands spoke in favor of giving the contract to Bruce & Son the next lowest tender, claiming that this was the only fair way to deal with the matter.

Trustee Mills said that he considered the only fair way under the circumstances, would be to call for new tenders.

The board decided, on motion of Trustees Baldwin and Bishop, to ask the City Council for the sum of \$10,000 to carry on the work at Louise school, pending the sale of the old Rideau school, when the money will be refunded to the council. The money is needed so that the work can be carried on, and be completed in time for the opening of the school for the fall term.

**Repairs to School.**

The property committee presented quite an extensive list of repairs to be carried on at the various schools during the summer holidays. The property committee was authorized to ask for and accept tenders where practicable, provided finances permit.

The following recommendations of the property committee were also adopted:

"Tenders were received for the supply of coal and the flintsmithing in connection with the stoves and furnaces in the different buildings. It is recommended that the tender of R. Crawford for coal and Elliott Bros. for flintsmithing, being the lowest, be accepted.

"That John R. Collinson be appointed caretaker of Frontenac school, salary, \$900 per annum, duties to commence July 1st, 1926."

**Other Reports Adopted.**

The following report of the management committee was adopted:

"That the resignation of Miss M. Fair, of the Collegiate staff, be accepted.

"That the tender of the British Whig Publishing Company for supplying blank books, foolscap and drawing paper for the public schools for one year, be accepted, the figures being the lowest.

"That the tender of R. Uglow & Co. for pencils, penholders, erasers

and rulers, being the lowest, be accepted."

The Health Committee reported having carefully considered the nurses' reports for last month and finding that the health of the pupils in general is good, while the number of communicable diseases is less than at any time this year.

On motion of Trustees Newlands and Godwin, the health committee was asked to consider the necessity of the school nurse visiting the Collegiate Institute.

The finance committee reported that the new rates for fire insurance on the public schools, and the Collegiate had been received, and recommended that the distribution of the insurance be left in the hands of the finance committee, with power to act. The board adopted the recommendation of the committee.

It was reported that the new rates are lower than the old.

### THE BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL BUSINESS

Elliott and others not yet named were appointed to attend the inaugural meeting in Belleville, on June 22nd to organize the Eastern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce.

The Board will seek to palliate the Ringling Circus managers who have a grievance against Kingston in connection with the fee imposed for circuses visiting the city. The matter at issue is unfortunate, but it is hoped it can be adjusted.

Mr. W. R. Givens resigned his position as a member of the council, and Mr. W. J. Coyle, a new member was appointed in Mr. Givens' place.

Mayor Angrove has about completed all the arrangements for the day. The vessel will arrive in the city in the morning, and it is the intention to tender a civic luncheon to Mr. W. H. Coverdale, president of the Canada Steamship Lines, and other officials of the company, who will be in the city for the presentation. The luncheon will be held at the Frontenac hotel and invitations will be issued to representatives of various civic bodies. Arrangements are being made to have the presentation of flags made at 2 p.m. or 2.30 p.m., following the luncheon.

He said the flag at that school had been half-masted, and the chairman also asked the secretary to send a letter of condolence to the members of the family, in their sad bereavement.

The management committee was given power to fill any vacancy on the public school or Collegiate Institute staff.

The chairman, Trustee L. T. Best, presided at the meeting, and the other members present were Trustees Anglin, Baldwin, Bishop, Elliott, Godwin, Johnston, Jones, Lemmon, Mills, Newlands, Revell, Stewart and Wightman.


