FOUND INSTITUTIONS IN GOOD CONDITION

Grand Jury Recommends Central Heating Plant for Court House and Jail.

The Grand Jury empaneled at the present sittings of the General Sessions of the Peace presented its report on Thursday afternoon. The members visited the General Hospital, Hotel Dieu, The Home for the Aged, the Court House, the county jail, the Orphan's Home and all other public institutions receiving grants from the county. They found conditions prevailing at these places to be excellent and commented particularly on the cleanliness. The management of the hospitals and the Homes were complimented as was also William Toner, the caretaker of the Court House, and Joseph Hawkey, governor of the jail, for the splendid appearance of their respective institutions.

Recommendations made by the jury included the installation of a central heating plant for the jail and the Court House and that certain repairs be made to the jailer's residence. The grants from the county were being applied to the best possible advantage the jury found.

LATE THOMAS SMITH OF AMHERST ISLAND

Deceased Was Member of Township Council—Aged Sixty-five Years.

Stella, June 10.—The community of Amherst Island was saddened on learning of the death of Thomas Smith, who passed away at his home in the early morning hours of June 7th. Deceased, who was born and spent most of his 65 years on the island, was well known and highly respected by the entire community. He was a member of the municipal council for four years, and was held in high esteem by all his fellow councillors. He was known by his neighbors, as a man of firm convictions, yet of quiet and patient disposition, and one who always sought the best interests of his community, without selfish ambition. His spirit of quiet resignation and patience was evidenced through many weeks of suffering, during which time he was never known to complain, but consistently endeavored to consider others, rather than himself.

There remain to mourn his loss his widow, and eight children, Mrs. Smith and five of the family, Mrs. S. Robinson, Mrs. W. Taylor, Tillie, Ray and Robert, reside at Amherst Island; Mrs. George Cleasahan and Bert in Kingston; Lusanne in Alta Vista, B.C. There are also a number of grandchildren.

Mr. Smith's body was laid to rest in Glenwood cemetery on Tuesday afternoon. Service was held at his late home at 2:30 by Rev. R. G. Fry. The funeral was very largely attended. 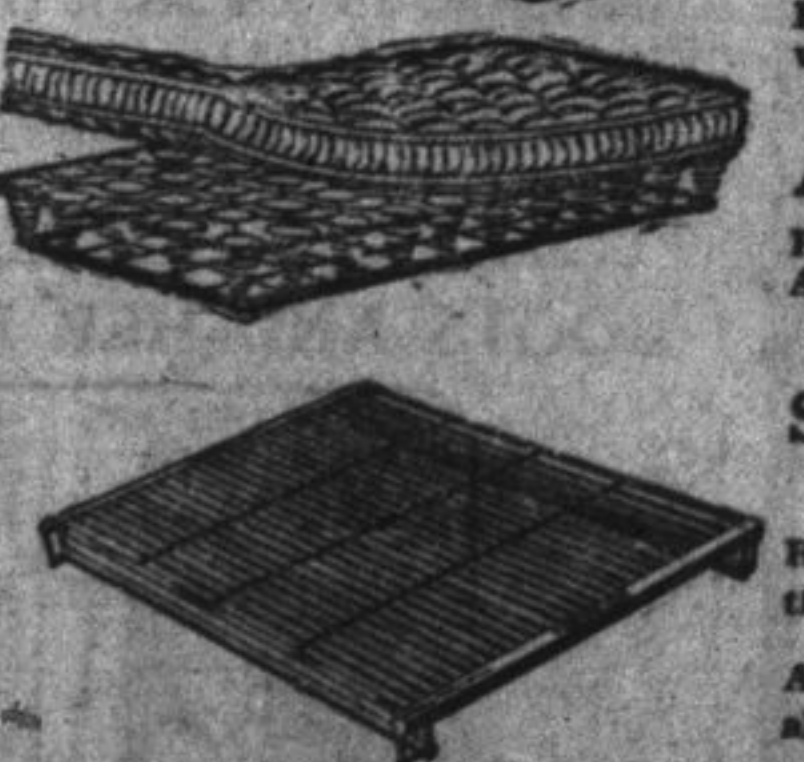
