Died in Montreal.

Big Door Closed.
The big door opposite the police station, on the market square, has been closed for a few days, to allow men to carry out their work on the buildings. One of the windows in the police court room also had to be boarded up to give the window the necessary protection.

Leaving for England.
Lieut. T. D. Burke, who won the King's prize in 1924 and the King's medal at Ottawa last year, and who is a student at Queen's University, is leaving for England on Saturday with twenty sharpshooters, members of the Canadian Bisley team, in charge of Major C. R. Crowe, of Guelph, Ont.

John Latone was presented at Shire Hall, Belleville, with a testimonial, handsomely framed, from the Royal Humane Society, the result of gallantry in saving the lives of Arthur S. Shields and Leslie Martin, who were in peril of drowning in River Moira on June 4th, 1925.

The funeral of George Tibbetts, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Tibbetts, Ontario street, who was drowned a week ago Wednesday, was held on Thursday afternoon from John Cornelius' funeral chapel to Cataract cemetery. The funeral service was conducted by Ensign Falls of the Salvation Army and four members of the Sunday School acted as pall-bearers.

The report of the attendance officer, Mrs. Eason, as reported to the Board of Education, follows:

May Call Ottawa Minister.
By unanimous vote the congregation of Trinity United Church, Montreal, decided to recommend the Rev. J. H. Osterhout, Ottawa, to succeed Rev. J. H. McConnell. Rev. Mr. McConnell has been forced to resign from the pastorate of the church

owing to continued ill-health of his wife.

Good Work of Contractor.
The construction on the upper fire station is nearly finished. Citizens who witnessed the engineering feat of substituting steel beams for the timber that formed the arch across the front entrance of the building, are unanimous in praise of Contractor Harry Hunter. The work was accomplished without an error in calculation, and the building has been permanently strengthened by steel rods that tie the main piers.

Was Sentenced to Penitentiary.
Russell VanSickle, aged nineteen years, Hamilton, who shot himself in Buffalo when Aileen Curtis, his sweetheart, threatened to leave him, in Hamilton until three weeks ago, and had a good position with a large industry. Recently he wrote relatives stating that he was going home with his wife. He was arrested on six charges of housebreaking and theft and was sentenced to twenty-six months in Portsmouth penitentiary.

Fortune-Cochrane Wedding.
A quiet wedding was solemnized at the manse, Gananoque, on the morning of Wednesday, June 9th, when Rev. C. E. Kidd united in marriage Harriett Edna, youngest daughter of Mrs. Rebecca J. Cochrane, Lansdowne, and the late James B. Cochrane, and Arthur Edward Fortune, second son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Fortune, Mallorytown. The young couple were attended by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Slack, Lansdowne.

School Attendance.
At the meeting of the Board of Education on Thursday night, the attendance at the public schools in May was given as follows:

The enrolment at the end of the month was 2,718, or 17 more than for May last year. The average daily attendance was 2,470, an increase of 32.
The enrolment at the Collegiate for May was 799, with an average daily attendance of 659. This is a decrease of 33 in enrolment and 31 in average as compared with May, 1925.

War Memorial Shipped.
The war memorial in honor of the men of Campbellford and Seymour who gave their lives in the great war is being shipped by the McCallum Granite Company, Limited, to-day to that town. The memorial has been in process of manufacturing since January of this year and when erected will be an exceedingly worthy tribute. It is twenty feet in length and fifteen feet high and is made of white granite throughout. The memorial will be erected during the coming week by representatives of the local firm and will be unveiled on Sunday, June 20th, at Campbellford. It is to be situated in the park beside the Trent Valley canal. The inscriptions and carvings are featured on both sides so that they can be seen both from the street and by people passing in boats. The memorial was executed from the company's own original design.
