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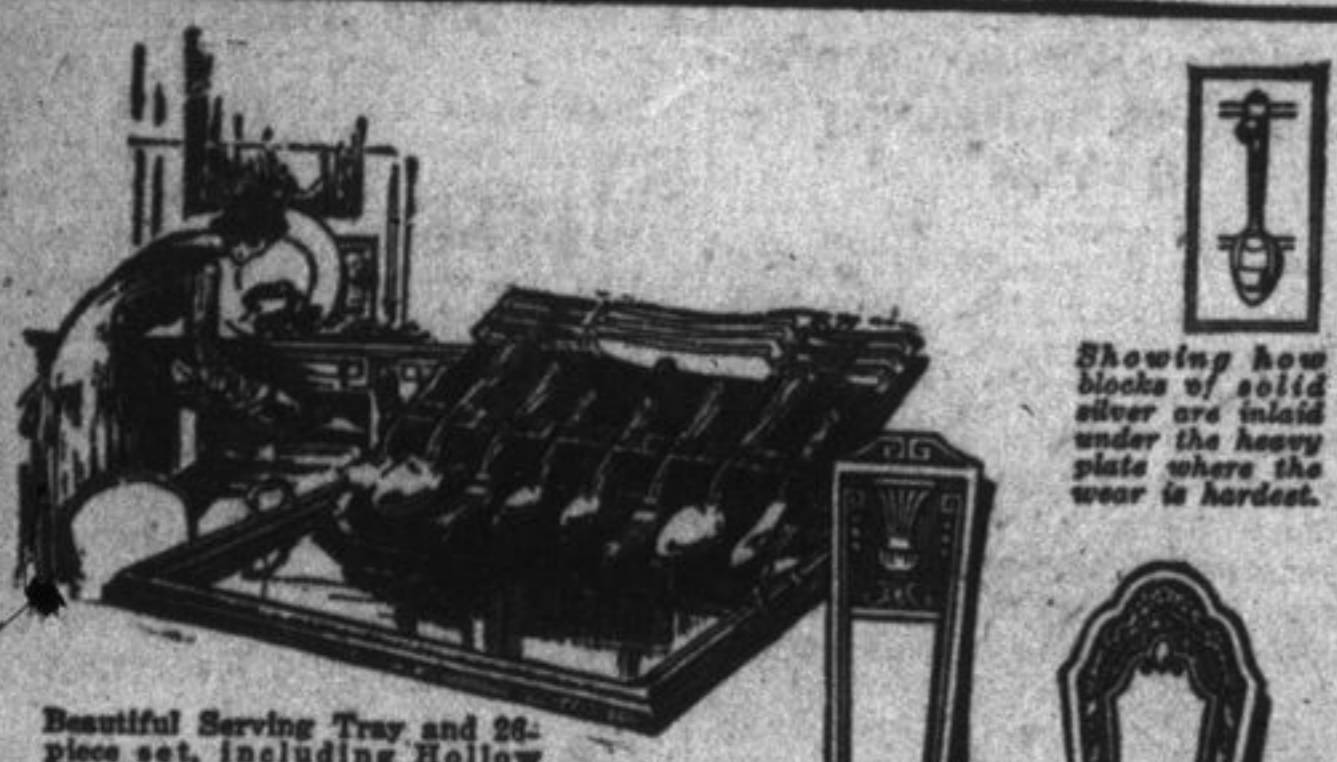

LATE R. O. PATTERSON LIVE STOCK DEALER

Passed Away on Saturday—Was Widely Known Throughout District.

One of the best known and most popular residents of the district passed away at his home, 442 Albert street on Saturday in the person of Richard Oliver Patterson. Deceased was in his forty-fifth year.

The late Mr. Patterson was perhaps the best known live stock dealer in this part of the province. He carried on his live stock farm at Joyceville, and had spent considerable time between Kingston, Joyceville and Toronto, making many trips to Toronto in connection with his business, being well known in Toronto live stock circles.

Mr. Patterson was a member of Sydenham Street United Church. He was a Conservative in politics, but had not associated himself actively in political life. He was a son of R. S. Patterson. He is survived by his widow, three sons, Gordon of New York and George and Reginald of Kingston, and one daughter, Betty of Kingston; also by four brothers, William of Kingston, John of Winnipeg, Frank of Lethbridge, and Fred of Picton. Two sisters, Mrs. G. V. Franklin of Kingston, and Mrs. Alfred Graves of Lethbridge, also survive.

The funeral took place on Monday afternoon from his late residence, 442 Albert street, to Cataract cemetery. Rev. C. W. Hollingsworth of Sydenham conducted the service. The funeral was very largely attended, many from Kingston and Pittsburgh townships, where Mr. Patterson was widely known, being in attendance.

CLAYTON, MAN SEEKS DIVORCE.

His Wife Re-married Lives Now in Rochester, N.Y.

After living with her husband for twenty-two years at Clayton, N.Y., and then suddenly leaving her home without notice in 1922, evidence in divorce court before Justice Irving R. Devendorf showed that Mrs. Ella M. Marshall is now married to Rev. James Wheeler, former pastor at the river village. Evidence further disclosed that Mrs. Marshall is now living with husband No. 2 at Rochester and at the present time, because of this, George C. Marshall seeks a divorce from the mother of his two grown children.

"I did not leave my husband because anything happened," said Mrs. Marshall some time ago, but because of the way my husband slandered me. My husband has always been jealous of me and I have put up with it because we had two children. They have grown up to be young men now and I will not put up with it any more."

But early in May, 1923, Mrs. Marshall obtained a decree of divorce against her husband under the Pennsylvania law, which permitted her to set up an allegation of drunkenness against him and win her suit on that ground in the face of no opposition by him.

Three days later she was married at Scranton to her sixty-two-year-old free lance Baptist clergyman-suitor and they went to Rochester, N.Y., where they now reside in one room at 25 Gorrell street. At the same of her marriage to Wheeler, she gave her age as forty-four.
