Underwent Operation. Mrs. George A. Deare, of Godfrey, underwent a serious operation at the General Hospital, and her many friends will be glad to learn that she is doing nicely.

Made W. I. Superintendent. Miss Hazel McCain has been appointed superintendent of the Quebec Women's Institutes. She was at one time dietitian in the D.S.R. military hospital in Kingston.

Showing Improvement. The many friends of Rt. Rev. Monsignor Hartigan, who has been confined to his room at Prescott for several weeks through illness, will be pleased to know that he is convalescing.

To Have Restricted Soliciting. The board of Alexandria Bay, N.Y., has made provision whereby restricted soliciting may be carried on during the summer for hotels, boarding houses, boats and garages. Licenses will cost \$50, and a penalty of \$100 will be imposed for breaches of the ordinance.

La Salle Causeway Flowers. Many complimentary remarks are being passed by citizens and tourists about the beautiful appearance of the lawns and borders along the La Salle causeway. Mr. B. Davy, superintendent of the causeway, has been very busy this spring looking after the plants, and his efforts have been rewarded.

Given Use of Cricket Field. At a meeting of the City Council on Wednesday night, a communication was received from A. V. Hanley, president of the Kiwanis Club, asking for the use of the cricket field for Bob Norton's circus on July 22nd, 23rd and 24th, the proceeds to go to the welfare fund of the club. On motion of Alder Kent and Kidd, the request was granted.

To Extend Albee Street. At a meeting of the City Council

held on Wednesday night, the following recommendation of the Board of Works was adopted: "That Albee street be extended from Collingwood street to Beverly street, and that Thomas A. Carson's donation of land where the street crosses his property, be accepted."

Go Slow on Causeway. Car drivers who "step on the gas" while crossing the causeway had better be careful or they may get into trouble. Large signs at the entrances to the bridge notify motorists that the speed limit on the bridge is ten miles an hour, but despite this many rush over at the rate of twenty and twenty-five miles an hour. Steps are being taken to stop this.

Died From Injuries. Donald, the sixteen-month-old son of Adjutant and Mrs. J. Oldford, of the Salvation Army, formerly of Napanee, now of Kansas City, fell from a second storey window of the city hotel at Kansas City some days ago and died from his injuries the following day. The little tot was sitting on the floor in the Oldford apartments and in the absence of the mother for a few minutes, climbed on a chair and fell out of the window.

Appreciated Dr. Wilson's Work. Rev. Dr. G. C. Pidgeon reported for the work of the bureau of literature and publicity, and described it as "the right hand of the committee on law and legislation." It had done splendid service. G. W. Mason, K.C., counsel for the church, paid tribute to the work of Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson, who had given up one of the best Presbyterian pastorates in order to take this work up. The council unanimously carried a resolution of appreciation of the work of Dr. Wilson and his staff.

The Late Erasmus F. Smith. Erasmus F. Smith, a former well-known Canadian National Railways employee, who was in the passenger service as conductor on the local train running between Brockville and Toronto until his superannuation on pension on July 1st last year, died in Brockville on Tuesday after an illness of two weeks. He was a native of Leeds County, but a resident of Brockville since he was a small boy. His wife, two sons, two daughters, two brothers and two sisters survive. One son, Frank, resides in Kingston.

A Queen's Man Prominent. The Montreal Star paraphrasing voted figures at the United Church Council, says: Dr. Ernest Thomas, of Toronto, besides attaining great prominence in religious life, has reconciled capital and labor in Vancouver, done much to stamp out "class war" in Toronto, and otherwise entered into public life. As a theologian he has done remarkable work, and is a prolific and pungent writer on religion and allied topics, and a controversialist of no mean ability. He was born in England, and received his doctor's degree at Queen's University, Toronto.

Kudoba, of Kitchener; Grand Representatives to Sovereign Grand Lodge, Philadelphia, P.G.P. Adam W. Switzer, Toronto, elected for two years, and P. G.P. John McCorrie, Chatham, elected for one year.

RETAIL MERCHANTS' MEMBERSHIP CANVASS

J. C. Campbell, Ottawa, Assistant—Retailers Worked for Auto Duty Reduction.

Mr. J. C. Campbell, secretary of the Retail Merchants' Association of Eastern Ontario and Ottawa district, returned to Ottawa this morning after spending a few days here assisting the executive of the local association to put on a membership canvass.

Mr. Campbell reports excellent success here, and intends to return in about three weeks' time to complete the work here. He is firmly of the opinion that it is the advantage of every retail merchant to join the association so that the merchants will be able to present a united front on any question which affects them.

The association has gained a victory in the recent action of the Canadian Government in cutting the duty on automobiles. Mr. Campbell believes, as the retail merchants have been working toward this end for some time. One of the chief aims now is to increase the cost of the transient traders' license.
