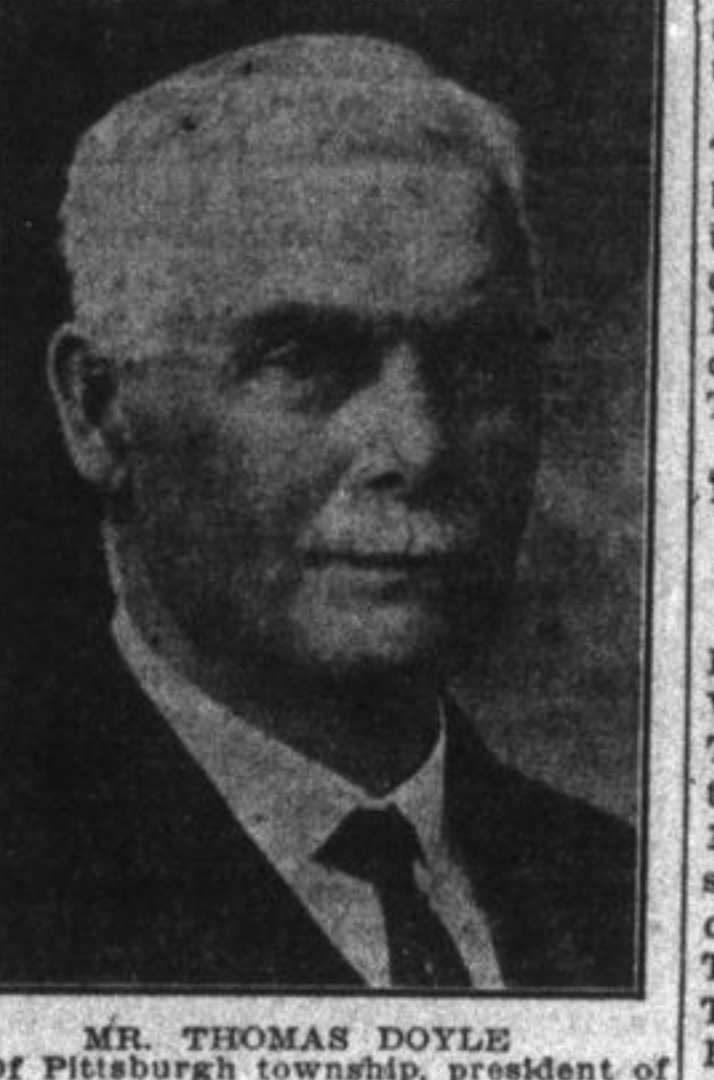

The departmental examinations will begin on Monday, at three centres at Queen's University-Grant Hall, the gymnasium and Arts' Clubroom. The Collegiate Institute has closed for teaching but the staff will be on hand all next week to advise and assist students who are taking examinations and who feel they need additional coaching.  
 Some 120 pupils seeking entrance qualifications from the Kingston public schools to the collegiate institute or other secondary school institutions have been passed on their records and will be excused from written examinations. Some 190 other pupils will write an entrance examination, in Grant Hall, on June 28th, 29th and 30th.

**GENEROUS GIFT**  
 Lt.-Col. W. R. Leonard sends \$15,000 to the Synod.  
 Lieut.-Col. R. W. Leonard, St. Catharines, one of the prominent laymen of the diocese of Niagara, has made a handsome gift of \$15,000 to the synod. The cheque, sent through the Toronto General Trusts corporation, was accompanied by a personal letter from the donor to Bishop Owen, conveying his good wishes and appreciation at the successful administration of the diocese by the bishop. The money is at the suggestion of Col. Leonard, to be divided equally among the aged and disabled clergy, widows and orphans and church extension funds. It is the first large individual gift made by a layman to the synod since Bishop Owen was consecrated about a year ago.  
 Lieut.-Col. Leonard has a notable career as engineer, business man and soldier, and is one of the outstanding citizens, not only of the Niagara peninsula, but of Canada. He is consistent in the carrying out of his duties as a churchman and is ever in the front ranks of citizens who give of their time, ability and means to the betterment of the community.

**REQUEST HAS BEEN MADE.**  
 For Fair Directors to Have Two Trains to Ottawa.  
 The popularity of the excursion held every summer to the Experimental Farm, at Ottawa, by the directors of the Kingston fair, is shown by the requests which have been received by Mr. R. J. Bushell, manager of the fair, to run two excursion trains to the Experimental farm next year, one over the Canadian National Railway via Napanee, and the other over the Canadian Pacific Railway, via Sharbot Lake and Tichborne. The excursion conducted on June 18th, attracted the biggest crowd of all, close on to 800 people taking the trip. The request for the two trains for next year's trip to the Capital, will receive the serious consideration of Manager Bushell and his directors.
