Nominated as D.D.G.M. John A. Derbyshire, Brockville, a past master of Sussex Lodge, A.F. & A.M., was the unanimous choice of the Past Masters and Wardens' Association of the St. Lawrence district meeting in Perth for the office of district deputy grand master of the St. Lawrence district.

Appointed Principal. Mr. J. H. Dolan, of the Central Collegiate staff, London, Ont., was appointed principal of the new London Collegiate by the Board of Education. Mr. Dolan is a graduate of Queen's University and married to a daughter of the late James Nugent of Kingston.

Kingston's New Hotel. The work of demolishing the old buildings on Bagot street, to make room for the new Randolph Hotel, is progressing rapidly, but it will be at least another week yet before this is completed and excavation started. The material taken from the old buildings will be used in the foundation of the new hotel.

Invited to College Class Reunion. Dr. Robert G. Ashcroft, 304 King street, has received an invitation to attend a unique reunion of his osteopathic college class at Mammoth Cave, Ky., on July 3rd. This reunion will be one of the social features in connection with the International Osteopathic convention which meets in Louisville the latter part of June and early July.

Pleading Not Guilty. Mrs. Burton Poole, Caintown, appeared before Judge Dowsley, Thursday afternoon and pleaded not guilty to a charge of forgery. She elected trial by jury and the case will be tried at the next session of the Peace in December. Bail was allowed

in the sum of \$10,000, the accused furnishing half that amount and two other sureties of \$2,500 were provided.

Are Paid Rebates. Messrs. H. Angrove, M. Oberndorfer, George Boyd, George Bawden and other auto dealers have been paid rebates on cars on which a luxury tax had been imposed, and lately abolished. Some of the payments were over \$1,000.

Sheep Dipping Tanks. Mr. A. W. Siret, county agricultural representative, and Mr. Eric D. McGregor, of the dominion livestock branch, are to-day installing sheep dipping tanks in the Mountain Grove district. One tank is being placed on the farm of Mr. James E. Price and the other on Mr. John E. Johnston's farm. Last week two tanks were installed near Harrowsmith, one of which was on Mr. Charles Shibley's property.

Off on Suspended Sentence. Judge Dowsley, Brockville, suspended sentence on Gordon Truelove, Howard Truelove and Wesley Conway, all of Bedford Mills, in the county of Frontenac, who on May 19th pleaded guilty to perjury and who were billed to appear for sentence. Owing to the principal in the case having been acquitted by a jury last week and the giving of evidence in behalf of the Crown by the three men accused in the present case, sentence was suspended. The trio were given their liberty on their own recognizance to appear if called upon at any time within two years, and to be on good behavior.

Engaged As Teachers. Mr. Rudin, who has accepted the position of principal of Smith's Falls, Collegiate Institute. His initial salary is to be \$3,200 with an increase of \$100 a year up to \$3,600. He has had twenty-five years experience in high school work at Sault Ste. Marie and Arnprior. He has been at the latter town two years. Miss Hubbell asked for an increase of \$100 in her salary and her salary was increased that amount.

The steamer Pentland, a large freighter owned by Capt. Hinchley, sunk near Clayton, has been raised and towed away. The Pentland, a complete wreck, was towed to Clayton about a year ago from Oswego and allowed to sink in the upper bay. The residents protested its presence as being not only an unsightly object but a menace to navigation and through the Clayton Chamber of Commerce its removal was granted by the navy department. Capt. Hinchley will convert the boat into a tow barge.
