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### OTTAWA TO OBSERVE 100TH ANNIVERSARY

#### Mayor Balharrie Extends Invitation to People of Kingston and This District.

The 100th birthday anniversary of Ottawa, to be celebrated Aug. 16th to 22th, was given a big boost here on Monday night when Mayor Balharrie, Controller C. J. Tulley, Ald. A. Belanger and Ald. W. R. Low entertained Mayor Thomas Angrove and a number of prominent citizens at a dinner held in the Randolph hotel.

Following the dinner, Mayor Balharrie, on behalf of the city of Ottawa, extended an official welcome to the citizens of Kingston and this district to attend the celebration in the Capital.

The Ottawa deputation left Ottawa at 2 o'clock, Monday afternoon, by automobile, via Prescott, and, on their way to Kingston, stopped at Brockville and Gananoque, where they also extended an invitation for the big event to be held in Ottawa.

Mayor Balharrie pointed out in his address, that the government had recognized the occasion as one of Dominion-wide significance, and that the representatives of the government were working with the representatives of the municipal government, so as this centennial will be one to remember for the next hundred years.

"We are bearers of a very cordial invitation on behalf of the people of Ottawa," said the Mayor. "Last year we visited Kingston, on the occasion of the Old Boys' celebration, to bring greetings from Ottawa. This year, a hundred and twenty thousand welcomes await you and all Kingstonians in Ottawa."

Mayor Angrove replied on behalf of the city and short addresses were also made by Controller Tulley of Ottawa and Major McKeene, reeve of Rockliffe, who was here attending the R.M.C. Ball.

The Ottawa deputation left here Monday night for Belleville, where they will to-day attend the "Get Together" conference of the Board of Trade of Eastern Ontario, and also extend an invitation to the people of that district to attend the celebration in Ottawa.

### Mayor Balharrie's Address.

"This year your Capital keeps her 100th Birthday Anniversary," said Mayor Balharrie. "To celebrate this event we are having a Birthday Party, which will do justice to the city's position as Capital of the great Dominion in the British Empire."

"From August 16th to 22th is set apart as the time for the Centenary Celebration and Exhibition and we are here as representatives of the citizens of Ottawa to extend to you, Mr. Mayor, your Council and your citizens an official and personal invitation to come to Ottawa during that time, to take part with us in this commemoration."

"This is not a local event of interest to citizens of Ottawa only. But we, acting as resident managers of the Birthday Party, have planned and prepared for a Centenary Celebration that, it is hoped, will please and satisfy every citizen of Canada."

"Your Government in Ottawa has recognized the occasion as one of Dominion-wide significance. The Government itself and the Ministers of the Crown as individuals are working with the representatives of the municipal government, so that this Centennial shall be one to remember for the next hundred years."

"The programme arranged is one in keeping with the Capital's status. The citizens of Ottawa are entering into the spirit of the occasion, and we invite you to come and do likewise."

"Apart from the various events for which we have arranged such as the Historical Pageant, the Western Stampede, the special musical and sporting events, we are enlarging our accommodation this year at Lansdowne Park, at an expense of a quarter of a million dollars. This is just mentioned as evidence of our earnestness and confidence in our success."
