FAILED TO EXERCISE CAUTION EXPECTED

Of All Seamen—Judgment is Given on Sinking of Steamer.

Ottawa, June 22.—The Dominion Wreck Commissioner, in a judgment delivered this morning, finds that James Cuthbert, master of the steamer Dalwarino, failed to exercise "that caution which is expected of all seamen." The judgment is on the case of a collision between the steamers Nisbet Grammer and the Dalwarino, near Thirty-one Mile Point, Lake Ontario, on May 31st. The Nisbet Grammer was sunk and became a total loss. Capt. Cuthbert's certificate is suspended for the balance of the season, but the court recommends the granting of a mate's certificate in the interim.

The master of the steamer Nisbet Grammer, Albert Laking, has had his certificate suspended for one month, and the mate, Marshall Robson, has had his certificate suspended for three months.

REPORT IN FAVOR.

Granting Loans to Canadian Native Railways and Merchant Marine.

Ottawa, June 22.—A select standing committee of parliament on railways and shipping, today reported in favor of granting loans or guarantees, amounting to \$21,000,000, to Canadian National Railways, and \$500,000 to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine. These amounts are asked for by the Canadian National Railway Company for the coming year.

DURHAM FARMERS ARE HERE ON A TOUR

Party of Thirty-two Are Making a Trip by Motor Bus.

A party of Durham County farmers, about thirty-two strong, arrived in the city in a large motor bus on Tuesday afternoon, on a trip of inspection which will take them all round Lake Ontario.

The party is in charge of Mr. F. C. Patterson, the agricultural representative for Durham, and the idea is to visit outstanding farms, orchards, herds of cattle and other subjects of interest to agriculturalists. They started from Port Hope this morning and expect to reach Watertown to-night. They will return home by way of Niagara Falls.

Already the touring farmers have seen many interesting displays including the M.H.S. chicken hatchery at Napanee. They will stop at Brockville for a short time to see the herds of Senator Arthur Hardy and in the United States market gardens, orchards, herds, and experimental stations will be given due attention.

Horses Had Legs Broken; Carcasses Sold to Butcher

Ottawa, June 22.—Two horses, part of an experimental shipment from Moose Jaw to Europe in September, 1925, under Government auspices, "each broke a leg and were sold to a butcher," it was stated in the House of Commons yesterday in answer to a question.
