COMMISSION AGAINST TEX RICKARD'S PLAN

Would Not Grant Permission for a Tunney-Dempsey Bout.

New York, June 22.—Tex Rickard deposited his boxing orphan, the proposed Dempsey-Tunney heavy-weight match, on the doorstep of the State Athletic Commission yesterday, but it was promptly turned out.
By a vote of two to one, the state fathers formally rejected Rickard's application to stage a title bout between Dempsey and Tunney at the Yankee Stadium on Sept. 15th, after the promoter had offered to post on the spot a \$50,000 forfeit guaranteeing that the winner would box Harry Wills in 1927.

EIGHTEEN KILLED AS TWO LIMITEDS CRASHED



This picture shows one of the most disastrous passenger train wrecks in recent years. The Chicago-Cincinnati-Pittsburgh Limited, of the Pennsylvania Railroad crashed into the Pittsburgh-Washington Express at Gray's Station, Pa., about fifty miles east of Pittsburgh. The death toll was eighteen. The Washington Express stopped to repair a coupling hook and the Limited, following close behind, ploughed into it. Three sleeping cars of the express and the club car of the limited were telescoped. At the extreme right can be seen the demolished steel club car in which five passengers lost their lives. The picture also shows the two derailed locomotives of the limited and at the left can be seen part of the last Pullman of the express. Preliminary investigation indicates the engineer of the limited failed to notice signal flags of the express.
