TOURIST CAMP OPENS IN TWO WEEKS TIME

Plans Further Advanced at a Meeting Held on Tuesday Afternoon.

The Citizens' Tourist camp committee held another meeting on Tuesday afternoon, and report satisfactory progress in the work proceeding to carry on the camp at Lake Ontario Park.

New Ferry Terminal.

The building is of attractive architecture, and is constructed of patent process cement blocks with white and grey granite pebbles pressed into the outer coating, giving it the appearance of a solid granite structure.
