**THE IMPORTANCE OF WOMEN'S INSTITUTES**

**Those in Frontenac County Are Rendering Good Service—Annual Meeting Here.**

The fifth annual meeting of the Frontenac County Women's Institute opened its session on Thursday morning at 10.45 o'clock (standard time) in the Assembly Hall of the Eastern Ontario Dairy School with the President, Mrs. J. D. Shibley, in the chair. Following the singing of "The Institute Ode" by the large gathering, the minutes of the last annual meeting were read by the secretary, Mrs. G. W. McNaughton, Sydenham, and were passed without comment.

The president, in presenting her report declared that the Frontenac County Women's Institute was an organization that was looked upon as one that did a great deal of good. She

stated that it was well to take stock of the Institute at different intervals and check up on the progress being made. She made a strong plea for an increased membership, pointing out that in membership there was strength.

Mrs. Shibley stressed the work of service to be carried out in the Institute and urged that the members increase the importance of the Institute in the community. She stated that the district could reach heights only by the greatest co-operation of every branch and it was up to every member to increase the strength of the branches as well. There was an unlimited field of activity and although not as much had been accomplished as would have been liked, Mrs. Shibley felt that if the branches aimed at one particular object, that more would be accomplished.

The report of the secretary-treasurer showed that great strides had been made in membership in the Institute during the year. There were now 441 members. The executive had met only once during the year but a great deal of business had been carried on through the mail. The report stated that the thirteen branches of the Women's Institute had joined the Horticultural Society and it was expected that great interest in this branch would be taken.

Mrs. McNaughton in her report, thanked the Agricultural Representative, Mr. A. W. Strrett, for the assistance given to the Institute during the year, also Mr. L. A. Zuffel, Superintendent of the Eastern Ontario Dairy School, and the press for the assistance given.

The financial report showed the General Institute with a balance of \$120.42 at the start of the year. The receipts for the year had totalled \$251.29 and the expenditures, \$250.21, leaving a balance of \$1.09. The branches showed a balance on hand of \$1,287.03, the receipts having totalled to \$3,627.48 and the expenditures to \$2,321.76, leaving a balance of \$1,305.92.

**Splendid Advice Given.**  
 Miss Ethel Robson, Denfield, addressed the meeting. She stated that she had just completed a six weeks tour of the district, visiting the branches and she delivered an address containing splendid advice for the women. She told them to not regard their efforts in the Institute as a burden but to enter whole-heartedly into the work with a spirit of adventure. She advised them to get the best out of their work and strongly believe in the Institute and its value to the community, this building up a real community spirit. She urged the members to accept the responsibilities of the Institute and give their earnest support to the officers who are chosen, whether they like them or not.

Miss Robson deplored the lack of interest shown in the rural schools by the women and declared emphatically that it was their duty to take more interest and know what was going on. She stressed that the Institute was not a club but an organization to give real service to the entire community. She strongly advocated closer co-operation between the old and young members and in conclusion, advised the women to make use of the rest room provided for them at the Agricultural rooms and appreciate it.

Reports from the different branches, showing the activities of each branch during the year, and bringing to light some valuable work accomplished, were presented by the branches of Mountain Grove, Parham, Godfrey, Harrowsmith, Sydenham, Inverary, Sunbury, Battershaw, Glenburnie, Pittsburgh, Westbrooke and Frontenac Juniors.

**Election of Officers.**

**FERGUSON REPEATS SAME OLD STORY**

**He is Wary of Suggesting a Date for the Next Election.**

Bayfield, June 24.—It was an old story which Premier Ferguson told here yesterday to upward of 5000 of the Western Ontario Conservative Association, and representing to a marked extent, the County of Huron and the southern part of Perth.

Anticipated or otherwise, Mr. Ferguson devoted some of his time to the Ontario Temperance Act question, reiterating, in this connection, the Government's determination to canvass public sentiment from one end of the Province to the other, and when satisfied as to the proper course to pursue with regard to the act, to submit that course to the will of the people.

"Public sentiment," he said, "placed the Ontario Temperance Act on the statute books. It will stay there if it is the wish of the people."

"Sure! Sure!" came cries from the crowd.  
 "But," the Premier continued, "if the Government finds, after careful consideration, that it can make an improvement that is considered to be in the welfare of the people, then it will submit that improvement, and on that issue it will be defeated or re-elected."

Premier Ferguson said he had been criticised from many quarters for his stand with regard to plebiscites, but in declining to submit another plebiscite he was but following the sound British constitutional principle of representative democratic government. "We will face the issue fearlessly," he said, "and we shall not hide ourselves behind women's skirts, church organisations or any other kind of barrage."

**TORONTO LIBERALS' GUEST.**  
 Premier of Saskatchewan to Be Entertained To-day.  
 Toronto, June 24.—Hon. James G. Gardiner, Prime Minister of Saskatchewan, will be entertained here to-day by Toronto Liberals. He arrived in the city in the morning and will spend the day here. In the evening he will be the guest of Dr. J. H. Cascaden, president of the Toronto Liberal Association, at dinner at the Outing Club. Later a reception will be held in honor of the visiting premier of Saskatchewan.

**HOLLINGER DIVIDEND.**  
 Is Increased to Twenty-Six Per Cent. a Year.  
 Montreal, June 24.—Directors of the Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines, Limited, at a meeting held in Montreal yesterday afternoon increased the dividend from 20.8 per cent. to 26 per cent. per annum. In future payments of 10 cents per share will be made every four weeks instead of 8 cents as heretofore. The first payment at the new rate will be made July 15th to shareholders of record June 29th next.  
 A rate of 26 per cent. per annum means that Hollinger in future will distribute \$4,398,000 per year or \$42,000 every four weeks. At the old rate of 20.8 per cent. the company distributed \$3,116,800 each year or \$393,600 every four weeks. Thus Hollinger shareholders will receive increased dividends of \$98,400 each dividend period or an aggregate increase of \$1,279,200 for the year.
