LEARNING TO SWIM IN THE Y.M.C.A. POOL

On First Day of Campaign 125 Boys Lined Up for Instruction.

"Hey! Skinny come on in—the water's fine!" "Gee, I wish I could swim like that guy." "Say Bill it's time you came to the 'Y' for a wash."

It was a squirming noisy group of boys that lined up in front of the Y.M.C.A. on Monday morning, waiting for the doors to open, for it was the first day of the annual free swimming campaign, conducted by that institution, for the benefit of the boys of the city. Local school teachers co-operated in getting boys to register, and 125 boys were all ready to go when the first class went to the pool. Mr. Phil Brockel had secured a number of good swimmers from among the "Y" members, and they acted as assistant swimming instructors to the boys who are just learning the rudiments of the art. A modified form of the Australian crawl stroke is used by Mr. Brockel, in teaching the boys, this being the most approved method used by the most successful swimming instructors, including Capt. Corsan of international fame.

Mr. Brockel and his corps of swimmers try to inspire confidence in the minds of the boys from the first. Fear of the water is the thing that must be avoided, and the instructors are careful that no boy is pushed into the pool. One lad of eleven on Monday morning was afraid to go in, although he went so far as to get undressed and enter the shower bath. He was allowed to watch the other boys for a while, and promised to be on hand on Tuesday, and will make a start in the water.

Many parents are loud in their praises of the Y.M.C.A. for conducting the annual free swimming classes. One prominent citizen pointed out last week that the sad fatality of last month would probably never have occurred had the boy received the instruction which is offered free to the boys of Kingston each year.
