**A SUNKEN GARDEN AT MURNEY TOWER**

An Interesting Proposal Made by the Kingston Horticultural Society.

At a meeting of the directors of the Kingston Horticultural Society, held Tuesday night, at the home of the president, Prof. J. Macgillivray, Lower Albert street, many important matters were discussed.

It was decided to solicit the cooperation of the Historical Society and of the civic authorities to have the most surrounding Murney Tower transferred into a sunken garden. Thus an unsightly mass of weeds, stones and sticks would be turned into a beauty spot, and add to the pleasure of those visiting the museum.

A request will be sent to the mayor and city council asking that the cutting of weeds be a semi-annual operation, once before the seeds have ripened and again when a second growth of weeds has appeared. Special emphasis should be put on the destruction of ragweed, which is so plentiful along our streets, and which, in the pollen stage, is one of the main excitants of "hay fever."

An effort will be made to have the boulevards in front of public institutions, cleaned up, and the grass kept neat, while a general brightening up and beautifying of many ugly spots in the heart of the city will be attempted.

A home garden competition is being offered. Names for this must be in by August 1st and there must be twenty-five competitors to make a class.

A special prize for the children of Frontenac school is being offered by Miss St. John. Sixty-five children have entered for this. Seeds have been distributed to them and a recent inspection of the garden spots showed very satisfactory results. The children will exhibit at the Horticultural show, August 24th and 25th.
