BASEBALL PROBLEMS.

What is the rule governing the play where a fielder throws his glove at a batted or thrown ball and it comes into contact with same?

When a player throws his glove at a batted or thrown ball it must strike it or no attention is paid to the act.

If the glove does hit the ball then the offending player is severely penalized.

The old rule was that on a batted ball all runners were entitled to advance three bases and on a thrown ball two bases.

This rule is still operative but a rather drastic addition has been made to the original rule.

British Golfers Have Had Too Much Playing

London, June 30.—Walter Hagen's opinion of what is the trouble with British golf, as printed in The Evening News, has resulted in a mild storm of disagreement among the players who participated in the recent tournaments.

Many of the British players disagreed with Hagen's assertion that young British players are too "gosh darn lazy," while others feel that by the time the open championship comes around they have been worn out by preceding tournaments.

Ted Ray, well-known British professional, disagreed, as to Hagen's suggestion that British golfers are not good match players.

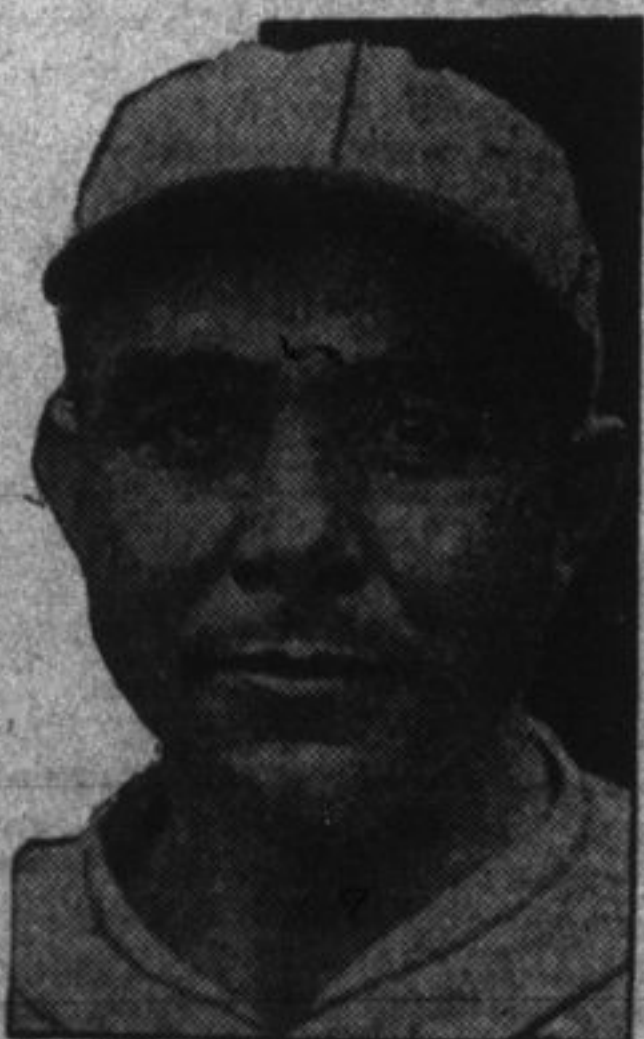
"Why, we beat the Americans at Wentworth in the Samuel Ryder Cup, in the singles and the foursomes," Ray said. "British courses have suited the Americans this year. The greens have been very slow, and we of British professionals are accustomed to fast greens in the summer. As to being lazy, well, there are a lot of tournaments just before the championship, and we have not got much time for practice."

Aubrey Boomer, winner of The Daily Mail tournament, who fell far behind in the open championship, said that it was difficult to keep up

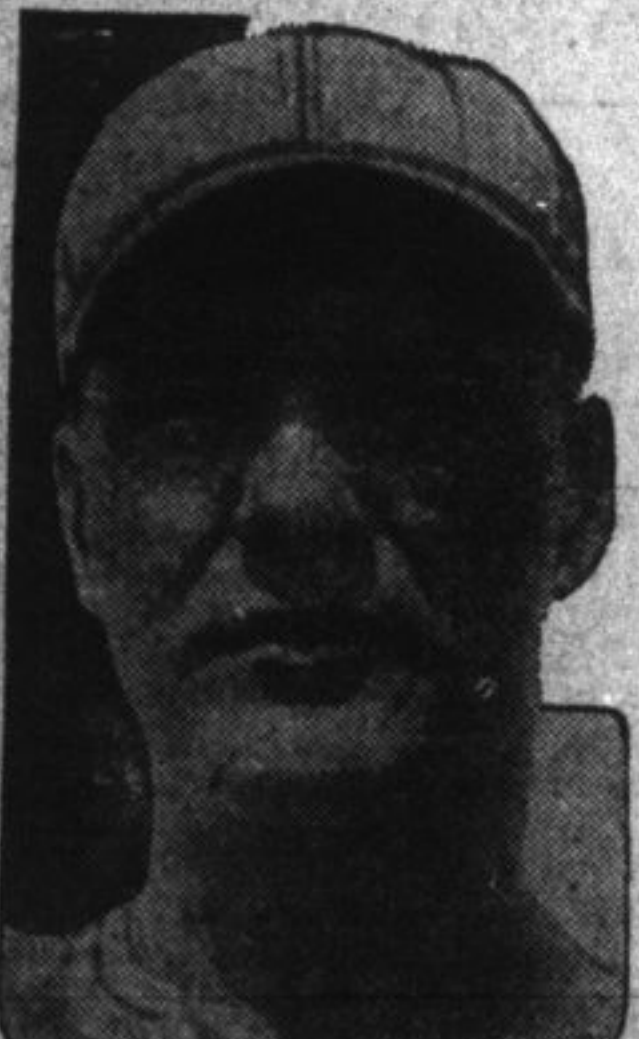
form for two months, a task that most British players have to face. "Had some of us entered in the bigger tournaments before St. Anne's, there might have been a different story at the open," he declared.

They Figured in Big Trade



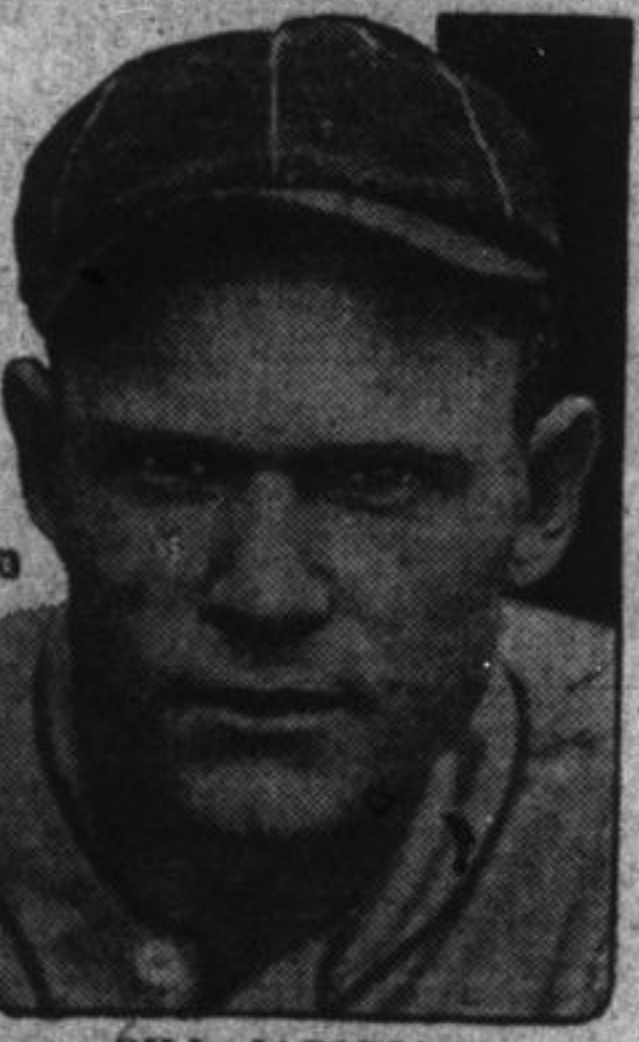

There five prominent performers figured in one of the biggest trades in the American League has put over in some time.

Through the deal the elongated Connie Mack obtained Howard Ehmke from the Red Sox; the Browns got "Bill" Miller and the Phillies Heimach, Harris and Jacobson.

Ehmke, Heimach and Harris are pitchers, the first-named being considered one of the best in the circuit. Ehmke, 32, put in six seasons with Detroit before being traded to the Red Sox in the fall of 1922.

Miller and Jacobson are outfielders. Miller was traded to the Mackmen by Washington in the winter of 1922, while Jacobson joined the Browns as a regular in 1917.

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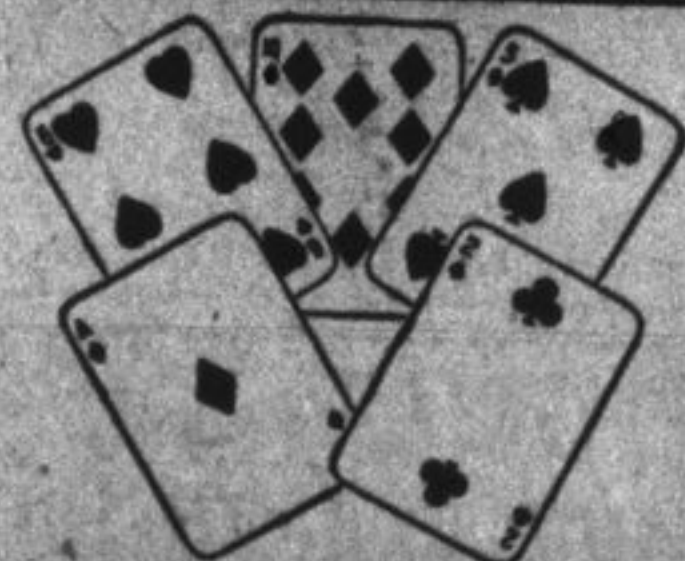
