The boy, in company with a couple of companions, was riding to Kingston Mills, and as the party was proceeding along the road at a comparatively slow speed, the forks of the bicycle ridden by Jack Munro broke. He was thrown to the ground, bruising his face and one arm, and was rendered unconscious. A motorist who was following the boys, brought the injured lad to the hospital, and about three hours after the accident, he recovered consciousness. This morning he is reported to be doing very favorably.
