Saving in Postage.
Penny postage came into force in Kingston on Dominion Day. One firm in the city who had 1,200 letters to post, delayed the posting for one day and saved \$12. Other people were putting in drop letters for the city with only one cent stamps on them. The rate is two cents.

The money, in bills, had been used as advertising for a picnic in the store window, and at closing time was placed in an unlocked vault. During the night the premises were entered by means of a rear window and the bills abstracted.

Private Bill Withdrawn.
A private bill which has been withdrawn from the order paper of the House of Commons is General A. E. Ross' measure to incorporate the executive council of the Free Methodist Church in Canada. Proponents of the bill have signified their intention of not proceeding further with it this session.

SPEED OFFICERS TO ENFORCE THE LAW

Careless Lighting on Automobiles Is to Be Closely Checked Up.

No longer will the driving of motor cars on highways at night with only one headlight or the absence of a rear light be tolerated by the provincial speed cops. Instructions have been received by the local men to take the numbers of all cars found on the road thus equipped. Glaring headlights, long a complaint for many motorists, is due for some attention from the officers. Held up as the cause of many a bad accident, the men have now authority to summon a driver to court for failing to have his lights properly adjusted. The Provincial highway officers have received notification of the orders, which will, no doubt, have the effect of making driving much safer. County police will also enforce the new rules.

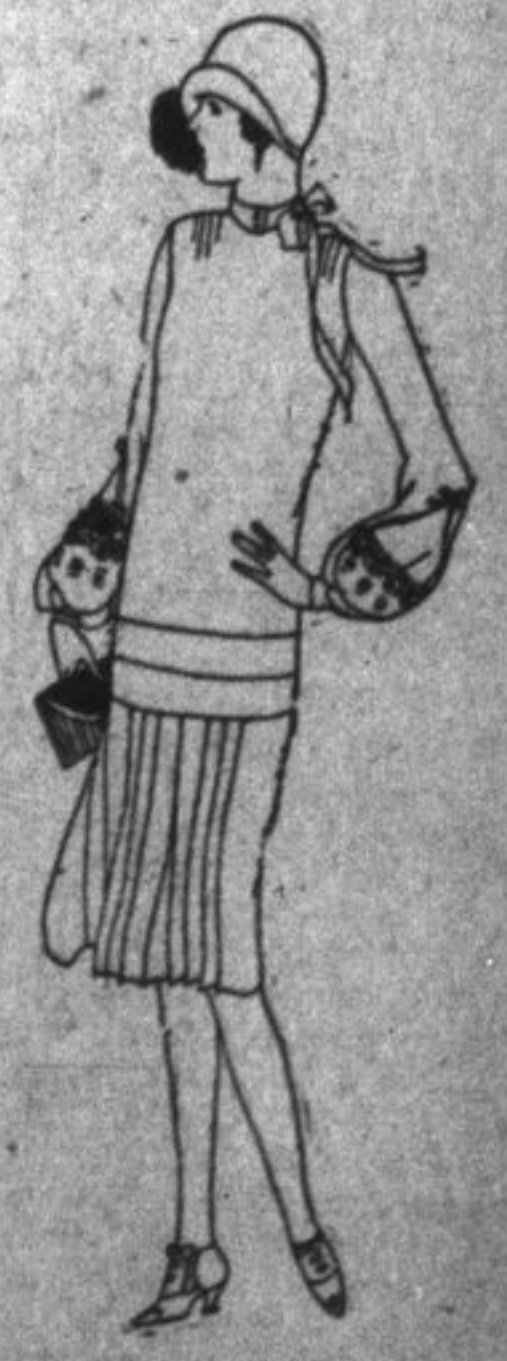
