### NATIONAL SERMONS IN THE CHURCHES

Dean Craig and Rev. G. A. Brown Deal With Timely Subjects on Sunday.

In speaking of Canada in St. George's Cathedral on Sunday morning the Dean of Ontario referred to the nearness of the diamond jubilee on the Dominion and of the love her people have for our great and utiful country, Archdeacon Scott voiced the feeling of Canadians his poem "O Canada, my Country and my Love." Still from coast to coast there was a feeling that all was not well with the country. "We have passed through a great political crisis", said the dean. "I saw somewhere it was the greatest crisis in the history of the Dominion. However that may be and without taking er side of the question, it does to all of us that our need is a g impartial leadership. The hu ian race demands leaders and am bassadors. An ambassador is one who will express the will of the people, but a leader is one who will help to form that will. It had been said, the Dean continued, that democracy did not supply leaders. He referred to John Hampden, to Gladstone and to Abraham Lincoln, all outstanding leaders of democracy. 

It is true that the Kingston firm has an option on the building but it depends to a considerable extent on the action of the city council as to whether it will be purchased. Mr. C. A. Macpherson, president of Mc-Kelvey & Birch, says however, that he does not anticipate any great obstacles in this direction for so far the city has shown itself very favorably disposed toward the sale.
