**SPARKS CIRCUS WILL NOT SHOW IN KINGSTON**  
Agent Writes City Treasurer to Have License Cancelled—Merchants Had Contracts.

The Sparks Circus will not show in Kingston, although one of the agents was in Kingston on Friday last, and secured a license from the city treasurer, and also signed up with a number of local merchants for supplies.  
It was arranged that the big show would be here on August 5th. On Monday morning Mr. O. V. Bartels, the city treasurer, received a letter from Henry L. Maasie, agent of the circus, at Montreal, in which he stated that the circus had been cancelled. The letter from Mr. Maasie reads as follows:  
"Owing to a change in railroads, and conditions arising over which we have no control, the Sparks circus will be unable to exhibit in Kingston on Thursday, Aug. 5th. Kindly cancel license and lot contract. Please advise Mayor Angrove. Am most appreciative of His Worship's and your kindness to me."  
Mayor Angrove was at a loss to understand why the circus had been cancelled, and for this reason he has wired the agent for a full explanation.  
Message of Reply.  
Mayor Angrove received the following telegram from Mr. P. L. Balguy, General Manager of Sparks Circus, in reply to his message, "Circus cancelled on account of radical change in route. Also we don't care to follow Morton's Circus, sorry: will see you next year. As we feel very kindly to your city."

**OBITUARY**  
Mrs. Norman A. Smith.  
With startling suddenness, death came to Mrs. Norman A. Smith, 25 Division street, on Saturday. Mrs. Smith had been down to the bank of Toronto on Saturday morning and while there suffered a stroke. Her condition was noticed by one of the bank officials after some little time and Mrs. Smith was removed to her home where she died at 6.30 in the evening, without recovering consciousness.  
The news of Mrs. Smith's death caused widespread regret among her many friends in the city. Although she had not been in good health for some years, her death was a great shock and keen sorrow was expressed at her passing.  
Mrs. Smith was born in Glenburnie but had resided nearly all her life in Kingston. She was the daughter of the late Francis M. Bushy, an Anglican in religion and a member of St. James' church. She is survived by her husband, three daughters, Mrs. A. E. Doherty, of Kingston; Mrs. H. D. Harling, of Toronto, and Mrs. Roy McCormick, Kingston; also by two brothers, Charles M. Bushy, of Yorkers, and D. Bushy, of New Rochelle, and one sister, Mrs. Martin, of Portchester, N. Y.  
The funeral took place on Monday afternoon at four o'clock, from her late residence to St. James church, where the funeral service was conducted by Rev. T. W. Savary. The pall-bearers were three sons-in-law, and Fred Briggs, Hewitt Smith and Percy Otten.
