### REPORTS ARE ROADS FAR FROM RELIABLE

According to Statement of Kingston Motorist Who Made a Trip to Montreal.

A Kingston motorist, who made a trip to Montreal and back last week-end, is of the opinion that the information regarding road conditions handed out by some of the so-called tourist information bureaus is far from reliable.

Between here and Cornwall, there are three different road contractors doing construction work, and while no work is being done on the roads in Matilda Township, they are in very bad condition this gentleman says. The road from Cornwall to Montreal is good. The first bad spot is just west of Gananoque. There is a long stretch of big stone there, and no means of getting through, except running over the top of them. The road is passable, but that is all that can be said for it. Between Gananoque East and Ivy Lea, the road is in a similar condition.

The worst place of all is just before coming to the village of Morrisburg, however. At that spot, so the motorist said, the stone was piled up in the road higher than the axle of his car. The number plate, which was at the bottom of the radiator, was bent back under the car by the stones and the fabric of practically a new tire was badly cut to pieces.

When this motorist went to the tourist information bureau in the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, and asked how the road was to Kingston he was told however that it was in excellent shape. His complaint is, and it seems a just one, that the information bureaus do not keep up-to-date on road conditions, and that if they tell tourists that a road is good and the tourist finds that it is decidedly bad, he will not have a very kindly feeling toward Canada. This gentleman thinks that if the road contractors exercised more care and had more thought for the travelling public road conditions could be greatly improved.

### Jumps Into River When Motor Boat Took Fire

Brockville, July 5.—A motorboat owned by Antoine Wending "Highview" and valued at \$2,000, was completely destroyed by fire yesterday morning when the engine back-fired as the boat was being given its trial run of the season on the St. Lawrence. W. C. Simpson, the driver, attempted to beat out the flames, which spread very rapidly, but he was forced to jump into the river to escape.
