REPORTS ARE ROADS FAR FROM RELIABLE

According to Statement Kingston Motorist Who Made a Trip to Montreal.

A Kingston motorist, who made a trip to Montreal and back last weekend, is of the opinion that the information regarding road conditions handed out by some of the so-called tourist information bureaus is far from reliable.

Between here and Cornwall, there are three different road contractors doing construction work, and while no work is being done on the roads in Matilda Township, they are in very bad, condition this gentleman says. The road from Cornwall to Montreal is good. The first bad spot is just west of Gananoque. There is a long stretch of big stone there, and no means of getting through, except running over the top of them. The road is passable, but that is all that can be said for it. Between Gananonue East and Ivy Lea, the road is in

a similar condition. The worst place of all is just be fore coming to the village of Morrisburg, however.
