WILLINGDON IN LONDON.

Returned From China by Siberian Route.

London, July 5.—Viscount Willingdon, Canada's next Governor-General, arrived in London last evening after travelling from China by the Siberian route.

It is understood that he will remain here for some time in connection with his mission to China regarding the Boxer indemnities. Otherwise Viscount Willingdon has formulated no definite plans, it is believed.

It is generally expected that he will assume his duties at Ottawa about the middle of September. when Lord Byng, in ordinary circumstances, will return. What effect the Canadian general election will have on this plan is not yet known but no alterations have yet been made.

WERE LED INTO TRAP ON EMOUMENT POINT

Believed That Meighen Ministers Violated the Statutes Governing Offices.

The Toronto Star on Saturday published the following special despatch from its Ottawa correspondent:

Even if the Meighen near government had not been defeated on the floor of the house last night, its members had violated the statutes governing offices of emolument under the crown and could technically have been de-throned by this fact.

No member having accepted an office of emolument may sit in the house. The Liberals led them into repeated admissions yesterday that they accepted this principle, but they believed it did not apply because they received no salaries or commissions. It now appears that they were deliberately led into the trap, laid for them by Hon. Charles Dunning and admitted later what appeared as a violation.

The act does not specifically say salary alone, it says emoluments. One of the perquisites, one of the emoluments of the office of a cabinet minister is a government car and chauffeur. Immediately after they took office the other day the new ministers took over the ministerial cars. Sir Henry Drayton's office notified Mr. Dunning's chauffeur that he was to place himself at the disposal of Sir Henry, which he did. This gave Mr. Dunning the impression which led to the trap laid in the house. Every one of the new ministers has ridden in a government car driven by gasoline for which the government paid cash, and by a chauffeur whose wages the government has paid. The emolument case has been proven to the hilt, and it is claimed that it does not matter whether the emolument is ten cents worth of gasoline or ten thousand dollars ministerial remuneration.
