Kaplan Retires From Featherweight Class

Meriden, Conn., July 7.—Louis (Kid) Kaplan yesterday relinquished his world's featherweight championship, effective immediately. Inability to make the class limit of 125 pounds was given by Kaplan as the reason for his action.

The crown will be returned to the New York Boxing Commission, which sponsored the elimination tournament which resulted in Kaplan fighting his way to the top.

The announcement follows Kaplan's victory over Bobby Garcia in a title bout at Hartford, Conn., a little more than a week ago.

Manager Denny McMahon said last night that Kaplan would seek championship laurels in the lightweight division.
