

The total assignments under the Bankruptcy and Winding Up acts for the whole of Canada numbered 120, as compared with 160 during May, 1925, and 131 in April of the present year. The liabilities of the assignors amounted to \$2,065,385 for last May and \$3,375,485 for May of 1925. The situation in Ontario also shows a considerable improvement, the figures being 49 failures for the month and 57 last year. Liabilities aggregated about \$981,000. Classifying the branches of business involved, it is found that there were 22 failures in trade, twelve in manufacture, four in service (professional, recreational, business, etc.), three in agriculture, two in construction, one in mining, one in transportation and public utilities and four in unclassified. The report as a whole reveals a much better state of things this year than last and a progressive improvement since 1922, when the comparative

Of the sixty or so civilized nations thirty-six now have women's suffrage in some form or another and in fifteen others organizations are working for enfranchisement. Of the thirty-six countries having suffrage for women fourteen

are under the British flag, some of the British dominions having enfranchised women earlier and more fully than the mother country. Australia granted suffrage to women in 1302, and New Zealand still earlier -1893. In Canada women won the franchise in 1918. Women of the Irish Free State alone of the British Isles have the same right to vote at the same age as men-twenty-one. In the others women must be thirty


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
