Montreal will likely have a western stampede in September.  
Chicago was parabolled on Friday in the severest heat of the year. The thermometer recorded eighty-eight degrees at noon.  
At Windsor the intense heat claimed its first victim when Frank J. McRae, aged sixty-two, Detroit, dropped dead in an office building.
