

### ACCIDENTS BEFEL STELLA RESIDENTS

#### A Municipal Election is to Be Held—Many Personal Notes.

Stella, July 12.—Farmers throughout the district gladly welcomed the heavy rains of Friday and Saturday. A number have been harvesting sweet clover and alfalfa. Hay in general will be a light crop with the present moisture. Grains, corn and roots should make rapid growth.

Nomination for a councillor to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Thomas Smith was held in the town hall on Thursday. The following were nominated: George T. Howard, William Glenn, Jr., David Caughey, Herman Willard, William A. Scott and Robert Reid. The latter four have resigned leaving the two former, George T. Howard and William Glenn, Jr., in the field. The election will be on Thursday next. Both candidates have served in the township council before. Keen interest seems to be manifest in the contest.

A series of accidents and misfortunes have crossed the pathway of a number of residents in the past week. During the severe electrical storm which passed over the island on Friday night lightning struck and instantly killed a valuable young team of horses the property of Robert Fillion living on the 2nd concession. The horses with others were in the pasture and were some distance apart. The animals were insured in the Amherst Island Mutual. W. P. Tugwell, also living on the 2nd concession, had his barn struck with lightning and shattered some of the lumber. George Beaubien's barn on the Front Road was also struck and slightly damaged.

Samuel Fleming, a farmer living on the 3rd concession, met with an unfortunate accident on Friday. Mr. Fleming, with his brother, had been drawing hay into the barn, standing on the top of the load when in the act of hauling the car to the stop-block, the trip-rope broke, throwing Mr. Fleming off the load to the cement floor below a distance of several feet, breaking one finger, injuring the unfortunate man's head, back and other injuries. Dr. H. S. Northmore was hastily summoned. But it was several hours before Mr. Fleming regained consciousness. At last reports he was doing as well as could be expected.

Friday seems to be keeping up its reputation for being unlucky. Reginald Instant, owner and proprietor of Emerald and Stella cheese factories, was returning home from the former place on Friday night in his car, a heavy Dodge touring, the

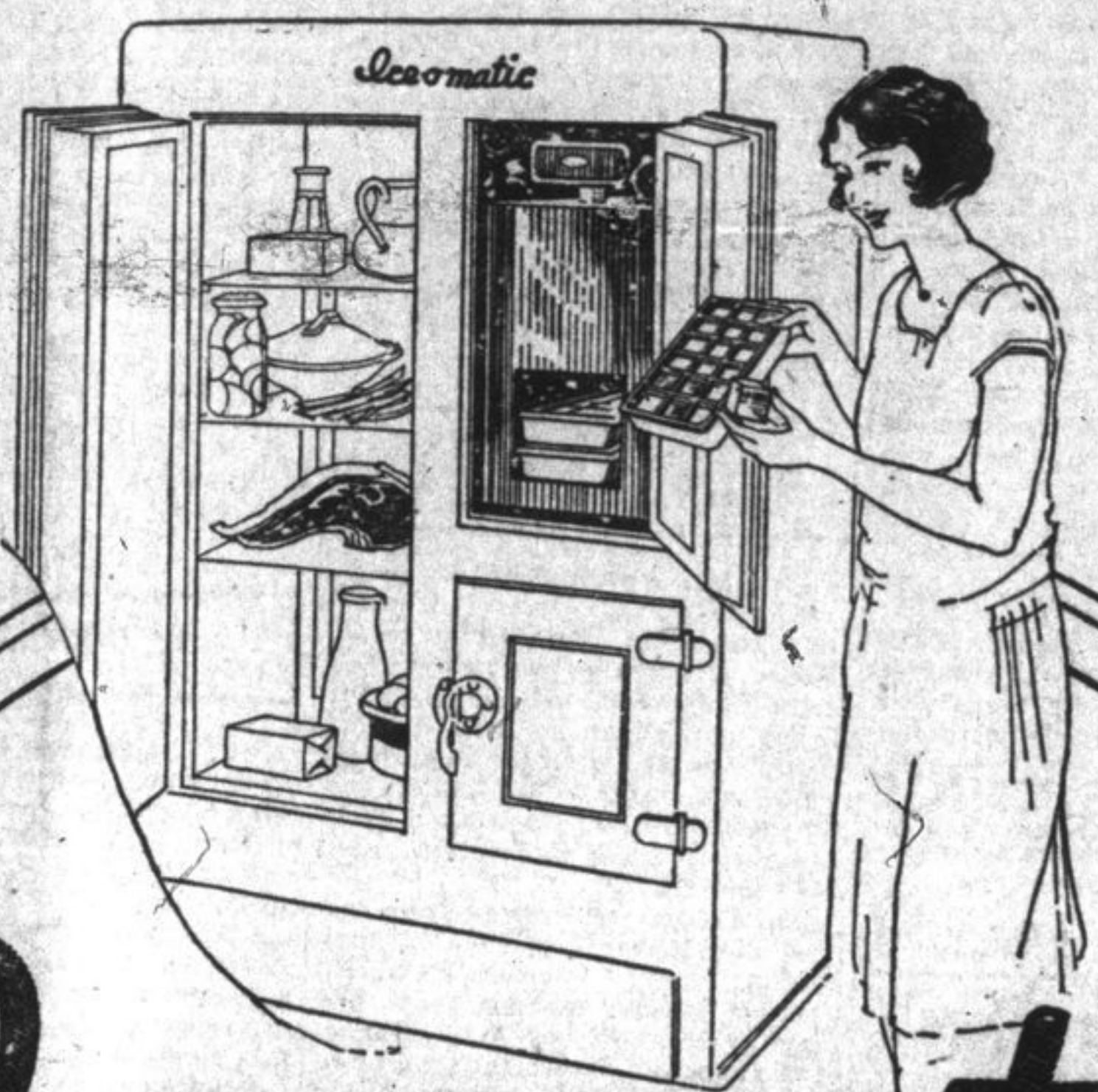

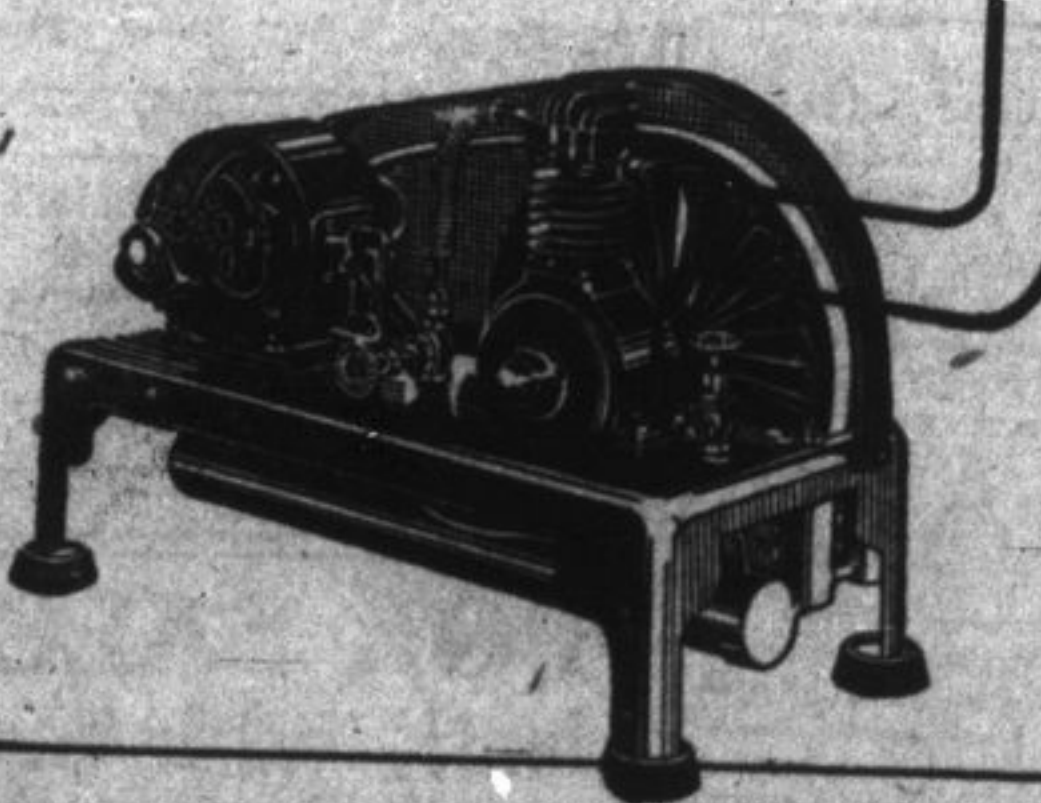

### KINGSTON TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.

Fixes the Tax Rate at 29 1-2 Mills

Cataragui, July 12.—A special meeting of Kingston township council was held on Friday evening to quickly advise. The tax rate will be the same as last year, 27 mills, with the addition of a special rate of incurred in the purchase of road

equipment, a roller, a grader and a sprinkler which will cost \$3,264.55.

The statement of finances at the end of last year showed a balance of \$180.04, the assets amounting to \$24,261.29, and the liabilities \$24,121.25.

The estimated expenditure for 1926 is \$29,460.01, as compared with last year's expenditure of \$28,988.24.
