OTTAWA TO ENSURE WELFARE OF VISITORS

During the Centenary Weeks—Special Railway Rates Have Been Secured.

Ottawa's celebration of its Centenary, commencing on August 16th, promises to be an event long to be remembered by citizens and visitors. Various committees have been working day and night in completing plans not only for the programme of attractions but for the reception and care of visitors. Hotels, boarding houses, private homes, tourists' camps and other accommodation will ensure every visitor being well looked after.

The programme for the two weeks will be on a scale never before attempted in Ottawa. Easterners who have never seen a stampede will be thrilled with the programme arranged for the first week. The same horses and cowboys coming to Ottawa have just completed a rodeo in Winnipeg where even those who have seen every stampede staged in the West voted that the Winnipeg horses and riders were the best ever.

For the first week other outstanding features will be a big military parade and tattoo on Monday evening, historical pageants, old time parades, sports of all kinds and entertainment for old and young.

In the second week the exhibition features will predominate. The stellar attraction will be Creators and his band. This wonderful organization ranks with the best on the continent. For the Ottawa engagement the band will be heard afternoon and evening in the exhibition grounds from the new bandstand, without any extra charge. Even if it were not for the hundred and one other factors in the big exhibition, the band in itself would be more than worth the price of admission.

Special rates have been secured on all railways and with excellent roads centering in the Capital, a big influx of visitors is assured.

The King Has No Policy

(Toronto Star) In an article written for the Globe on July 1st, dealing with the question of Canada's position when Britain goes to war, Prof. George M. Wrong says: "It may be well to go behind legal fictions and to realize that the king reigns, but does not govern. In the past the king had a policy. Now he has none. He does not choose his ministers. He does not declare war or make peace. It is the ministry, backed by parliament, which determines these things."

Prof. Wrong is head of the history department in the University of Toronto. His opinion on constitutional questions carries weight. And when he says that the king has no policy and does not choose his ministers he is only stating a truism. The people of Britain, long ago, established their exclusive right to exercise the powers of government. It will be different in Canada if national sentiment does not assert itself at the polls for in that case this country will be admitting its inferiority, and be acquiescing not only in the governor-general, the shadow of the king, having a policy, but in his having a policy not acceptable at the time he put it into effect to a majority of the elected representatives of the people then actually sitting in parliament.
