s Most Promising, Mr. Judson Jenkins Tells the Rotary

That the powdered milk industry has a great future in this country was the prediction made by Mr. Judson Jenkins, superintendent of the Farmers' Dairy Powdered Milk plant at Sydenham, speaking to the Rotary Club at the weekly luncheon Thursday. Mr. M. Bohan, the proprietor of the British-American Hotel, presided over the meeting.

Mr. Jenkins said that the Sydenham plant had been bought by the Farmers' Dairy Co., of Toronto about three and a half years ago and that it now was one of the most modernly equipped milk plants on the continent. The large proportion of the powdered milk product at Sydenham, is sold in Europe, said speaker although a small market found in Canada and the United States. Its chief uses here are in the manufacture of ice cream and in the baking business.

Mr. Jenking said that until within recent times when a process for removing the water from skim milk had been devised, skim milk had been used only for the stock on the farms. 
