LECTURED BEFORE FINANCE STUDENTS

GEOFFREY O'HARA SINGER AND COMPOSER

At the George Washington University, Washington, D.C.—J. Courtland Elliott's Work.

Mr. J. Courtland Elliott, M.A., a graduate of Queen's University, who has been carrying on researches in business and public finance in Washington, D.C., during the past year, was one of the several economists invited to lecture recently before the students of international finance at George Washington University. He spoke on Canada's Twentieth Century, outlining the main financial and economic developments responsible for our national growth and international prestige.

Mr. Elliott, who has been devoting the winter to publication of articles concerning Canadian economic events in American and Canadian financial periodicals, has been attached for the past six weeks to the United States Treasury, as special foreign investigator in international finance. During the summer months he is preparing a report on the Canadian balance of international payments and the restoration of the gold standard for the Federal Reserve Board, which supervises the American banking system.
