



As to personal status in politics "I am free in every way, as free from Meighen as I am of King. As to Imperialism: "I am attached to those who favor British bonds within the empire, but Canadian interests must be dominant in Canada. We must orient ourselves towards the most

As to what he termed "military im perialism," he said: "I am not ready to admit that when Britain is at war Canada should necessarily go to war." And then he showed where and from whom Mr. Meighen got his Hamilton speech: "No definite decision should be taken toward pulling Canada into warfare whether it be a matter of finance or of blood, without an appeal to the people." Mr. Meighen has grappled him to his soul and cabinet with
